BANK TO ERECT NEW BUILDING

State Bank of Redmond Will Build
In Spring

CONTROL OF STOCK
BEEN TRANSFERRED

Capital of Institution to Be
Increased by New
Management

Several changes were made last week in the affairs of the State Bank of Redmond. W. S. Rodman of Omaha, Neb., who had bought heavily of bank stock while on a former visit here, last week bought the balance of the stock of the institution, and new officers were elected. The new officers are:

President—W. S. Rodman.
Vice Prest.—Grace B. Rodman.
Cashier—C. B. Hopley.

Mr. Rodman stated that it was the intention to increase the stock of the bank and build a new bank building in the spring on property the bank has owned in the city for some time. It has not yet been decided on, said Mr. Rodman, whether the building would be of brick or concrete, but in either case the building will be modern in all its appointments, and built with the view to the future growth of the city.

Mr. Rodman is also heavily interested in real estate in Redmond and will put up a residence on one of his block of lots in Ellinger's Addition in the spring, that will cost between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

Mr. Rodman expects to leave for his home in Omaha, Sunday, the 22d, but will return in a short time with his family and locate permanently in Redmond. He said that as soon as the railroads reached here a number from his section of the country would come to Redmond and locate in the city and surrounding country.
