## PRINEVILLE MERCHANT DIES AT PORTLAND

F. J. Lively Succumbs to  
Serious Attack of  
Pneumonia

F. J. Lively of Prineville, died in the Good Samaritan Hospital at Portland, last week Wednesday after an illness of five days, aged 41 years. The following account regarding the death and burial of Mr. Lively is taken from the Prineville Journal of the 26th.

Mr. Lively recently purchased the property formerly owned by Ehret Bros. in Redmond and overhauled the building, intending to put in a stock of general merchandise. He left his home in this city two weeks ago for Portland, where he was buying the goods for the new store. He was to have been back on Wednesday of last week, but did not return and his wife was notified that he was dangerously ill with pneumonia.

A telephone message the first of the week stated that his condition was critical, and Mrs. Lively started for Portland Tuesday morning. Because of the sickness of her baby that was with her she did not get to Shaniko for the train yesterday morning, and will not arrive in Portland until tonight.

Arrangements for the funeral will not be made until her arrival, but it is probable that the body will be taken to Aberdeen, Washington, for burial. Mr. Lively's father and mother reside in Aberdeen.

Mr. Lively came to Prineville as drygoods man for the Wurzeiler & Thompson store about 7 years ago, and afterwards married Miss Arnold of Chattanooga, Tenn. They have four little girls. Mrs. Lively's father and sister are residents of this city. Mr. Lively was a member of the local Masonic lodge and was an Elk.

He was a member of the Live-ly, Jordan, Lanis Company of this city up to 8 months ago.

### Will Bring in Several Families

W. H. Knepper of The Dalles, is much interested in Redmond and this section, and in a letter to a business man here stated he would come here as soon as the railroad reached this point. A number of families, Mr. Knepper said, would come with him and locate in the Redmond District. The machinery, etc. for the new ice making plant and bottling works to be established in this city, has been ordered with instructions to hurry shipment of same. It is the intention of the promoters to have the plant in operation as soon as possible, some time in May they calculate.

### American Yeomen Instituted Here

W. A. Bullock, state organizer for Oregon of the Brotherhood of American Yeomen, organized a homestead of the order here last evening in Ehret's hall. The homestead starts off with a membership of about 25, and it is the intention to increase this number to 50 in a short time. ### Placing Track Center Stakes

Warren & Woodward of this city, resident engineers for 15 miles of the Oregon Trunk Line in this section went to Prineville last week to get 2000 stakes to be used as track center stakes for the road on the part of the line under their supervision, and same will be put in position at once. Mr. Warren figures that the road will reach Crooked River about Feb. 15th, and that it will take 40 days to complete the bridge across the stream, making the time March 25th. Weather conditions being favorable, the road should reach Redmond about April 10th.

### To Connect Powell Butte With Redmond Phone

G. E. Dobson, J. F. Hosh, M. E. Lynch and C. N. Ehret went over to Powell Buttes last Saturday to meet with the Grange there, and urge upon the Powell Butte people the advisability of joining with Redmond in a telephone line. No definite action was taken on the matter as presented by the Redmond delegation, but a promise was made that the question would be taken up later on.

## THE BROTHERHOOD OF AMERICAN YEOMEN

One of the Strongest Fraternal Orders Being Organized Here

The Brotherhood of Yeomen, a homestead of which was organized here last night, is now in its 14th year, with a membership of 150,000 with a reserve fund of \$1,360,614. The total assets of the Brotherhood are \$1,578,828. It is one of the strongest fraternal orders in the United States today. It is a fraternal and social organization, and carries with it insurance benefits. It insures against accidents, total disability, old age and death. Both men and women between the ages of 18 and 50 years are eligible for membership and can participate in the insurance benefits. The insurance rates are on a graduated scale according to age.

This society operates on the expectancy of life plan, which is the only plan of fraternal insurance that will never have to change the rates, thereby insuring the old man when he gets old for the same rate that he paid when he was young.

This Homestead organized here is number 3,049, which shows that the order is a growing one. At the present time about an average of 60 Homesteads are being organized a month. During the year 1910, 50,000 applications were written by the order.
