Local System Contemplate Improvements

NEW OFFICERS ARE NOW IN CHARGE

A Special Meeting Will Be Called to Amend the By-Laws

At a meeting held in this city Saturday night of stockholders of the Deschutes Mutual Telephone Co. the resignation of G. M. Slocum as secretary of the company was received and accepted. I. P. Hewitt was elected to fill the vacancy.

J. J. Ellinger was appointed president of the board, vice E. C. Park, resigned, and C. H. Miller elected manager of the company to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. R. McLellan.

It is stated that a special meeting will soon be called to take action in regard to amending the by-laws of the company for the purpose of raising money to take care of new construction, and to avoid levying future assessments on members.

The Spokesman is informed by one of the officers of the company that it is the intention to make a number of decided improvements in the phone service in the city and county the coming spring and summer.

It is understood that a committee from the Redmond Commercial club met last Saturday night with Powell Buttes representatives and the sentiment seemed favorable for that section joining with the Mutual Co.

Residents of Central Oregon are eager to celebrate the final entrance of the railroad into their territory. Already they are vying for the honor of being the first to ship freight out over the new line.

Agents for the road are making contracts for freight shipments on and after March 1. These are subject to acceptance at the point to be selected as the end of the line at that time. While Metolius, eventually, will be the division point for the service between the Columbia River and Bend the final terminus of the Oregon Trunk, it is not certain that Metolius will be the receiving point and distributing station for freight handled between March 1 and the time the road is completed to Bend.

Grading as far south as Bend has been completed and the work will be rushed to the place as rapidly as possible. It is probable, too, that freight trains will be operated to way stations south of Bend as fast as the road is extended south.

Settlers coming into the state with their goods loaded on single cars will be carried to their destination before March 1. Several are on their way now.

Polluting Waters of the Deschutes

A bill providing for a fine of from \$25 to \$500 for polluting the waters of the Deschutes river has passed the House at Salem, and it is expected it will pass the senate and become a law. The bill makes it a crime to deposit in the Deschutes river or any of its tributaries or canals fed from it, any sewerage, refuse, waste or polluting matter.

R. R. OFFICIALS HERE TUESDAY

Harriman Officials to Make Trip Over the Line

GETTING READY TO HANDLE TRAFFIC

Will Interview Shippers and Business Men in This Section

A party of local Harriman officials visited this section of the state this week. The party left Portland Sunday night for a trip over the newly constructed road up the Deschutes Valley. The object is one of preparation as well as of inspection. While it is desired to view the work thus far accomplished, arrangements will also be made for handling traffic on the new line as soon as it is ready for operation. Work now has progressed so far that the question of traffic is one that requires serious consideration.

R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the road, traveled with the party in the special train to the end of the line so far constructed, after which the party took automobiles for this city, Bend and points farther south to interview shippers and to arrange for their accommodation.

The party arrived in Redmond Tuesday forenoon. In the afternoon they went to Bend but returned here and were entertained in the evening at a "smoker" at the Commercial Club. Yesterday morning they left for Madras to participate in the exercises of "Railroad Day."

Other members of the party were Frank W. Robinson, general freight agent; M. J. Buckley, acting general manager; G. W. Boschke, chief engineer; J. M. Scott, assistant general passenger agent; F. R. Dunn, traveling freight agent; L. R. Fields, assistant general manager, and Shad O. Kranz, railroad editor of the Oregonian.
