Oregon Trunk Depot At Madras

A force of men is at work at
Madras building the new depot
for the Oregon Trunk Line at
that point, and it is expected to
have the building completed early
in April. The building will be
30x115 feet, not including the
porches to be erected on three
sides. The south portion of the
building will be used for waiting
rooms. The middle rooms of the
depot will be used as offices for
the railroad company. The
building is being constructed
with a view to accommodating a
large amount of business. It is
stated that an average of 75 pas-
sengers a day have been arriving
at Madras since the installation
of passenger service on the
Oregon Trunk.
