ALL HEADED FOR OREGON

Colonist Rush for This
State Is Setting a
New Record

LARGE NUMBER ARE
ARRIVING EACH DAY

Passenger Agents Estimate
That More Than 30,000
Will Come to State

The colonists rush from the
middle west and as far east as
Iowa and Illinois still continues
on the Harriman and Hill lines,
and every day special trains are
arriving at Portland loaded with
people who have heard about the
great state of Oregon, and the
chance to get cheap lands and
make their home in the land of
prosperity and plenty.

The remarkable rush to Oregon
has surprised even the officials
of the railroads and of the commercial
bodies who advertised extensively
to bring Oregon to the attention
of people in the east. They estimate
now that more than 30,000 persons
taking advantage of the colonist rates
will visit Oregon in March and April.
It is estimated that of this number
fully two-thirds will remain and
become permanent residents. The
others may drift back east, having
come merely out of curiosity and
the desire to travel.

At the Great Northern offices
in St. Paul and elsewhere it is
stated that about 85 per cent of
the inquiries received were about
Oregon, and that thousands will
come into Central Oregon over
the Oregon Trunk Line.

The towns in this part of the
state are making preparations to
take care of the newcomers as
they arrive, and adequate facilities
will be provided for their
comfort.

About an average of 2500 colonists
are arriving in Portland daily
over the Harriman and Hill
systems, and it is expected that
this number will continue for
several days. But it is expected
that the greatest rush will be the
last week of the low fare period,
in April, when 3000 daily arrivals
are looked for.

Railroad officials state that
Central Oregon, being the best
and most largely advertised part
of the state, will draw thousands
who want to settle on the present
cheap irrigated land.

This Section and Climate
Just Suits Them

F. H. Funk of Sheridan, Wyo.,
and C. R. Harper of Monroe,
Wn., who arrived in Redmond
last week are enthusiastic in
their praise of this section of the
state. Mr. Funk said that this
climate was just what he liked
and he had no idea that Oregon,
and especially this part of the
state, could produce such delightful
weather. Mr. Harper was also
loud in his praise of the climate
and country, and stated he was
going to locate here, as he
thought it was no use to look any
further for a good country that
combined both climate and soil.

CLUB HOUSE PROJECT
IS BEING TALKED OF

Attractive Natural Location
Can Be Secured
Near City

A number of the young men of
the city have been discussing the
question of buying some property
in the Mountain View Addition
and building an up-to-date club
house there this spring. This
matter was partially taken up
last year, but nothing definite
was done at that time. Since
then a new impetus has been

given the movement as more
men who would go into such a
project have located in the city.

The proposed site of the Club
House is an ideal one. The location
is attractive, and within a
few minutes walk of the center
of the city. One important feature
is the natural basin in the
old bed of the Deschutes river
that could be made into a large
swimming pool. This basin is
large enough for all purposes,
and with a slight outlay could be
put in proper condition.

The proposed site for the club
building overlooks the old bed of
the river, and a fine view of
Mount Hood, Washington, Three
Sisters and other mountains can
be had at any time when the
weather is clear.

space of 100x100, but will have

IMPROVEMENTS ARE TO BE MADE

Planning to Lay Concrete
Sidewalks in Business
District

RESIDENCE SECTION
IS TO BE IMPROVED

City Council Is Now Considering
the Above
Propositions

At a special meeting of the city
council held last Saturday afternoon
the question of building sidewalks
in the business and residence
sections of the city was taken
up and discussed at considerable
length. It was the sense of the
council that the best plan would
be to have concrete sidewalks in
the business section and board
walks in the residence district.

It was pointed out that as soon
as the railroads reach here, which
will be early in June, the cost of
materials entering into the construction
of concrete sidewalks will be
cheaper than such an extent that
the property owners can afford to
lay them in front of their business
houses.

The matter was gone over quite
fully, and it was decided to take
no definite action in the matter
until the arrival of the railroads
and then figure on the probable
cost of the concrete work.
