## OREGON TRUNK AT OPAL CITY

THROUGH TRAINS  
THERE BY APL. 16

Road Will Stop at Opal City  
Until Crooked River  
Bridge Is Built

The second link in the Oregon Trunk Line will be completed and ready for service inside of two weeks. This information was given out officially at Hill headquarters at Portland. This section of the line, which is headed for Redmond and Bend, will embrace the 12 miles plus between Metolius, the present southern terminus, and Opal City, a new townsite, four miles from the big Crooked River bridge.

While it has not been definitely decided, it is hoped to be able to send the first through train into Opal City on Sunday, April 16, and rapid progress is being made toward getting the line into shape. Two rapidly growing communities, which supply an extensive agricultural territory, will be reached by the latest extension, Culver, five miles below Metolius, and Opal City, which will be the railhead until the structural steel for the new bridge has been received and the bridge put up.

Construction crews are now engaged at Opal City in installing a "Y" and other necessary facilities for turning trains, and utilizing that point for a temporary terminus.

This will give the Oregon Trunk a completed mileage of 126, leaving but 30 miles more to go in order to finish the road into Bend, the farthest point south to which plans for construction have been approved.

It will take some time before any further links in the line can be added. It will probably be August before Redmond hears the toot of whistle or grind of rails. More delay than was expected has been encountered in getting the orders for the bridge material filled in the East. The first of the steel is due about April 25th, and about six weeks, as a minimum, is being allowed for putting up the structure, which is the highest one in America and the 7th highest in the world.

Once across Crooked River, it will be an easy job to complete the balance of the line, for the grade has been completed and the material can be hauled in over the Oregon Trunk rails as fast as needed.

It is estimated that nearly a trainload of inbound freight is being held up for delivery for Culver and Opal City territory as soon as the road reaches these points. The farmers are impatiently waiting in order to save the five-mile wagon haul from Metolius and the 12-mile haul to Opal City, whereas, up till this Spring, they have been forced to freight their merchandise in from Shaniko, a distance of 70 miles or more.

Oregon Trunk officials declare that the districts that will be reached by that line within a few weeks or months are clamoring more insistently now over hauling freight five miles from their line than they did when they had to haul it ten times as far over the rough and hilly highways from Shaniko.
