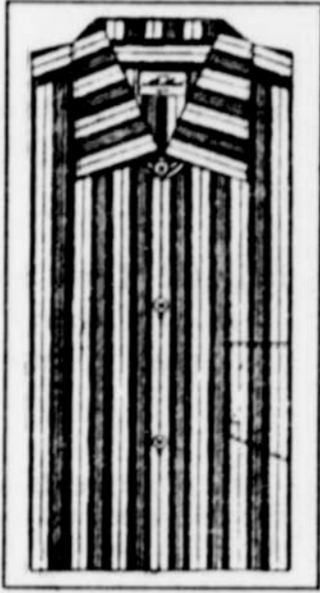

MADRAS WANTS NEW U. S. LAND OFFICE

Senator Chamberlain Takes Up Matter to See What Can Be Done

Madras wants to have that town made a United States land office, and the matter has been taken up with Senator G. E. Chamberlain, to see what can be done to that end. The purpose is understood not to be to eliminate The Dalles as a Government land office, but to carve out a new district, taking a portion of The Dalles and a portion of the Lakeview districts. Senator Chamberlain has written the Portland Commercial Club of the fact that the Madras Commercial Club has made the appeal, and that action will be taken in the premises at the earliest opportunity.

The Dalles has in past years been the nearest railway station to the center of the great land district which that city controlled, but since the Deschutes lines have been completed to Madras, the people of that aggressive town believe that the matter of taking public land should be made a less expensive and more convenient function. Madras is near the heart of a large area of public land. In The Dalles district alone there are 2,481,938 acres of public domain, while the

Invents a New Printing Press

The Meader-Cochrane Press is a new invention in the printing business. The press is built in job and newspaper sizes, and will print from one to seven colors at one time. Mr. Cochrane, one of the inventors, is a brother of Mrs. W. L. Wilson of this city. Samples of printing from the press have been distributed in Redmond during the past week. The press is fed from an endless roll of paper, and runs at a high rate of speed. When the machine is perfected it is expected it will work wonders in the printing business.
