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## G. N. OFFICIALS VISITED HERE

Note Many Changes Since Their Visit About a Year Ago

GATHER MATERIAL FOR PUBLICITY

Rapid Settlement of Redmond District Appeals to Them

The following party of Great Northern railroad officials arrived in Redmond Sunday night: E. C. Leedy, general immigration

agent, St. Paul; F. W. Graham, western industrial and immigration agent, Portland; O. A. Atwood, immigration agent, St. Paul; W. E. French, manager of the Oregon exhibit cars of the Great Northern railroad; W. C. Wilkes, assistant general freight and passenger agent, Portland; J. T. Hardy, traveling freight and passenger agent, Portland; and L. Griswold, district engineer.

The immigration officials were on a tour of inspection of this section to note the improvements and progress that had been made since their visit here a year ago, and to gather information to be used in further exploiting the central part of the state in the company's literature that is widely circulated in the east. The party was surprised to see the great change that had been made in Redmond in the way of building and municipal improvements which has placed Redmond in rank as the second city in size of population in the county.

The principal thing that appealed to them was the increased settlement on the irrigated land

tributary to the city that has obtained the past few months.

The party remained here until Monday morning gathering data and looking the country over. From here they went to Sisters and Laidlaw.

Miss Myrtle Butler gave a luncheon to the members of the "Valley Farm" troupe that put on the play here Tuesday night.
