DEPUTY SHERIFF PUT UNDER BAIL

Deputy Williams Who Killed Thos. Miller Bound to Grand Jury

Prineville Journal, June 8th: Deputy Sheriff Claude Williams of Opal City who shot and killed Thomas Miller on June 1st near O'Neil, had a hearing Monday before Judge Kennedy and was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of manslaughter. His bonds were placed at \$1000, which were furnished.

The Deputy Sheriff had Miller under arrest and was bringing him to Prineville from Opal City by auto, when Miller attempted to escape. Williams ordered him to stop but Miller kept on going until he was shot.

The prisoner was accused of stealing three hams from the cookhouse of the Oregon Trunk construction camp at Opal City, and was arrested by Williams on information given him by William F. Rogers, general superintendent of the boarding branch of the construction and improvement work along the Oregon Trunk and Spokane, Seattle & Portland. Mr. Rogers, George A. Jones, warehousemen at Opal City, James Boland, night watchman at the warehouse, and three others were eye-witnesses of the shooting of Miller.

50,000 TO 60,000 BALES OF HOPS

State Product Expected to Be Smallest For Many Years---Sap Sours

That Oregon will not produce over 50,000 bales, is now predicted by many of the representative dealers and growers.

The season is advanced sufficient to note the damage by the winter and spring climatic condition. Missing hills are still showing in ever section although in some places the outlook is not so unfavorable as in others.

The hills that are now missing are not likely to appear, according to most of the trade. It appears that during the months of February and part of March the weather was so warm that the sap started to move upward from the roots. The vines began to grow and many appeared above the ground.

Later with the late spring freeze, the tender shoots were killed and the sap running back into the roots soured. It is therefore figured that the roots will remain dormant during the remainder of the season although no evil effects are felt regarding the future.

College for Culver by Sept.

Culver Tribune, June 1: One of the most important things accomplished at the Christian church dedication last Sunday was the arrangement for the incorporation of a college to be located at Culver. There had

been some initial work done in the matter during the past month, but nothing tangible was done until Sunday. A fine block of land has been donated for college purposes with an additional block for a campus. The name of the incorporation is the Central Oregon Educational Association. The incorporators are Samuel Gregg, Geo. Rodman, Wm. Boegli, J. L. Windom, Cuyon Springer, E. F. Fulgham and W. P. Myers of Culver; Hon. H. P. Relknap and T. F. McAllister of Prineville, P. Chitwood of Grizzly, Dr. Snook of Madras, and J. N. B. Gerking of Laidlaw. Articles of incorporation have been prepared and will be filed this week.

Much Business At Gateway.

While here last week George Northrup, the owner of the town-site of Gateway, stated that the new town was doing a large shipping business. Five thousand sheep from the Hay Creek ranch were shipped out from Gateway last Friday, and 5000 sheep were shipped in for feeding purposes. Fourteen cars of stock were recently shipped from there that came all the way from southeast of Prineville. Gateway is the shipping point for a large territory, and all kinds of business houses are being erected there.

Good Record for Crook Schools

Superintendent Ford says that the school record of Crook county made last month is not excelled by any county in the state, according to the Prineville Journal. Out of 80 applicants that took the examinations only six failed. Sixteen were conditioned in one subject and thirteen in two subjects.
