SIX PERSONS SEE LONG SLAIN

J. L. Riley Cowed Five Men With Gun After He Shot Pugilist

RILEY HAS HEARING AT PRINEVILLE

Occupants of Auto Tell of Tragedy That Occurred June 1st

Testimony adduced at the preliminary hearing of J. L. Riley at Prineville for the killing of Louie Long near this city on June 1st, developed the fact that Riley visited his wife at Opal City the day before the murder.

They visited Mona Adams together at a house conducted at Opal City by Mona Adams and were last seen by her about 11 o'clock Wednesday night. Early the next morning Riley arose and took the train for Portland, but alighted from the train at Madras and at noon engaged O. E. Daffey to take him back to Opal City to find his wife there. Riley went to the Adams house and learned that his wife had departed a short time previously in an automobile with Louie Long and Mona Adams. Then the sensational chase by automobile began from Opal City to this city. Blowing out of a tire on the first machine caused the race to be lost and brought death to Long and injury to Mrs. Riley at a point on the road about five miles north of here near the Elliott ranch.

After killing Long Riley ordered the five men present to keep away from him or be shot. He then retreated to the hillside, reloaded his gun, called his wife from behind the automobile, and shot her through the right leg. She fell and Riley, thinking she was dead, started over the hill toward Redmond. He was captured a few hours later at Tetherow Bridge near this city.

At the preliminary hearing Mona Adams was put under bonds to insure her presence at the trial next October. The other witnesses were Jay Saftzman, chauffeur, who drove Long's car. With Saftzman H. N. Klipple, of Bend; Mrs. Riley and Mona Adams were riding. In the car with Riley were Chauffeur Guffey Marvin Wood, hotel proprietor at Madras, and W. E. Edmunds, clerk at the Hahn Hotel in Madras. They testified that they had never seen Riley before they took the automobile in which they raced after Long and Mrs. Riley.

Riley has refused constantly to talk about the tragedy and did not go on the stand at the preliminary examination.

Wyatt with his billiard and pool hall, and the upper floor will be cut into rooms for an annex to the Hotel Redmond. There will be 14 rooms. When the building is completed the Hotel Redmond will have the largest building in the county devoted to hotel purposes.

MADRAS WELL LOSES WATER

Madras Pioneer, June 8th: With all other difficulties that have beset the Madras City water works from the beginning another discouraging feature was encountered this morning, when the drill being used in sinking the well struck an air crevice at a depth of about 90 feet and allowed all of the water in the well to run out at the bottom.

The city authorities have concluded to abandon the well so far as a source of supply for the city water works is concerned, and will sink another somewhere on the townsite. The well which the bottom has just fell out of will be cemented in the bottom and is for sale. It is estimated that the well will supply about 500 gallons per day and would furnish water for 10 or more families, but would not begin to furnish water for the city system.

This well was dug from the surface to a depth of 70 feet with a diameter of 8 feet, and its construction up to date has cost the city in the neighborhood of \$1200.

While these little things are more or less discouraging, there is nothing to do but to keep trying until some well is found that will supply the required amount of water.
