OFF TO THE BIG CONVENTION

Delegate and Club Members Leave Tomorrow to Attend Central Ore. Development League Meeting at Prineville

Tomorrow, Friday, H. F. Jones, delegate from the Redmond Commercial Club, and a number of members of the club and business men of the city expect to leave for Prineville to attend a convention that will be held there June 30th and July 1st for the purpose of forming the Central Oregon Development League, to be composed of all the commercial clubs in the central part

of the state. Other towns in the county will send large delegations, and Prineville is figuring on entertaining 150 visitors.

Gov. West has announced his intention of being present. The secretary of state, the state land board, and the president and secretary of the Portland Commercial club are also expected to be there. Prineville is making preparations to entertain the visitors in a hospitable manner.

In forming the Central Oregon Development League it is the purpose to bring concerted action between the different commercial bodies of the county that they may work more intelligently and to better advantage for the upbuilding of this part of the state.

At this meeting some city in the county will be chosen for headquarters for the League, and the race to secure this plum is expected to be hotly contested. Redmond is in a position to offer substantial inducements to have the headquarters located here.

CREAMERY FOR THE HUB CITY

An Experienced Creamery Man From Wisconsin Is Here Interesting Farmers, Ranchers and Others in the Project

H. F. Meyer, formerly of Sheboygan, Wis., but now located at Tacoma, was in Redmond this week looking over this section of the county to see what the outlook and possibilities were for putting in a creamery here.

Mr. Meyer is a practical creamery man and from his observations while here is satisfied that a creamery in this section would be a paying proposition both to

the promoters and the farmers and ranchers, and he stated to The Spokesman that he would establish one in the city and be ready to begin operations about September 1st if enough cows could be secured in the district.

In order to establish a creamery here it will be necessary to have the farmers and ranchers guarantee the cream from 300 cows on the start. Lists for this purpose are now at Ehret Bros. and Lynch & Roberts store for signing, and it is urged that they be signed as early as possible by those who will furnish cream by Sept. 1st.

The plan as outlined by Mr. Meyer is to establish stations in different sections where cream can be delivered, and the creamery people will call and collect same.

IMPROVEMENTS FOR SPOKESMAN

other dry farming sections the rain was especially beneficial as the crop was badly in need of moisture. Some of the farmers in the non-irrigated section were feeling pretty blue over crop prospects before the rain came, but now they are wearing a smile and congratulating themselves on the improved outlook.
