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## FATAL WRECK ON ORE. TRUNK

**Train Leaves Track on Sharp Curve and Passenger Cars Go Down Embankment--One Man Instantly Killed and 25 Injured, Five of Which Die in the Hospital at The Dalles--Escaping Steam From Locomotive Literally Cooks Imprisoned Passengers**

One man was killed instantly, five more have since died in the hospital at The Dalles, and a dozen more were hurt when a south-bound Oregon Trunk passenger train plunged over a 40-foot embankment 23 miles north of Sherar's bridge at 3:35 o'clock Monday afternoon. The train was running 40 miles an hour when it struck a spread rail, caused by

the intense heat of the afternoon.

When the engine hit the sun-kink in the rail it left the track and rolled down a 40-foot embankment. The baggage car remained on the rails, but the day coach, following, left the track, plunging 40 feet to the top of the locomotive in the ditch.

When the car struck the en-

gine the escape valve of the boiler was ripped off and steam and hot water shot into the car filled with panic stricken passengers, who had been projected into the front end of the coach by the impact. P. J. Gallinger, a conductor, was riding with conductor Cass at the rear end of the car. Both clung to a seat as the car shot down the embankment. They escaped serious injury.

Thomas Miles, engineer, and George McKillip, fireman, said they knew nothing of the danger until the locomotive was rolling down the steep incline. Both men stayed with the engine until it struck the bottom of the ditch. McKillip was unconscious and was caught under the cab, but extricated himself before the safety valve was released.

A special train was made up at The Dalles and physicians were hurried to the scene of the accident. The injured were taken to a hospital there.

## DESERT LAND BOARD PROMISES RELIEF TO THE WATER USERS

**At Monster Meeting Held Here Tuesday Night Governor West and Members of the Board Listen to Grievances of Water Users in This District and Promise That a Thorough Investigation Will Be Made of Existing Conditions Between Water Co. and Settlers**

Governor West, Attorney General Crawford, State Treasurer Kay, and John H. Lewis, state engineer, all members of the State Desert Land Board, arrived here Tuesday evening and attended a monster meeting in Ehret's hall to meet members of the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. Water Users' Association and listen to grievances the water users in this section have against the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. so as to get an intelligent idea of existing conditions with a view to remedying the same.

Ben Gotter stated what the settlers considered their rights in the excess acreage matter, and Attorney General Crawford said he would bring a suit in the name of the state against the irrigation company and have the case threshed out in court.

Kirk Whited, J. J. Ellinger, J. A. Thompson and others explained to the land board the harmful conditions of the present irrigation association, presided, and a number of water users stated their grievances against the company.
