## THE FIRST FIRE IN REDMOND

Anker's Hall Catches Fire  
Last Friday From  
a Brush Fire

CHEMICAL ENGINE  
DOES GOOD WORK

Quick Action of Firemen  
Prevents Destruction  
of the Building

Redmond's first fire occasioned considerable excitement. It was Anker's hall on the corner of 6th and A streets, and had a narrow escape from burning to the ground last Friday afternoon.

Mr. Anker had been burning brush on the side and in the rear of the building, and when he went to dinner he supposed the fire had all burned out. During the noon hour a strong wind came up and fanned some of the smoldering embers into a blaze which communicated to the building and soon a good sized fire was under way.

An alarm was given and the chemical engine hurried to the fire where it did effective service in putting out the blaze. A bucket brigade was also formed and water taken from the irrigation ditch which is but a short distance from the hall.

A strong wind from the west was blowing at the time which helped stay the progress of the flames, as it blew the blaze away from the building.

The fire was confined to the rear of the building where the stage is, and Mr. Anker estimates his loss about \$200.

## HOME OF THE CHAMPION LIAR

A Yakima Editor Locates  
Him at Bend After Making  
Trip Over the Bend-  
Burns Auto Road, and  
"Hands" Him One

Prineville Journal: Editor Roberts of the Yakama Daily Republic, was in the Burns country a few weeks since, having gone through Bend by auto, and the following is the style in which he "gets even" with the fellow at the Crook county town who assured him the new road to Burns was like an asphalt boulevard:

"Bend, Oregon, is a small town but it is famous for two reasons. One is that it is situated on the banks of the best trout stream on the Pacific coast. The other is that it is the home of the champion liar of the world. We make this statement not in malice, but merely because we desire to render unto Caesar the things that are his. The Bend champion is now a full grown man, and he makes his living not by lying but by boosting for Bend, but in his youth he made a specialty of prevarication.
