## REDMOND'S POPULAR HOSTELRY



The above half tone cut is a picture of the Hotel Redmond recently taken. The hotel is located on the corner of Sixth and E streets, right in the heart of the city, and is one of the largest and best buildings in the interior of the state. The building has a frontage of 25 feet on Sixth street, and extends back 80 feet on E street. The ground floor is used for hotel purposes, except the south 50

feet on Sixth street, which are store rooms. The entire upper floor is devoted to hotel purposes, there being 45 bedrooms, all newly furnished. In the parlor the furnishing are elegant and modern. A Royal Wilton rug covers the floor, comfortable easy chairs are there, and a Steinway Grand piano occupies a prominent position. The dining room and kitchen arrangements are complete. The

kitchen is said to be the best appointed one in the state outside of Portland. The whole house is electric lighted, vacuum cleaned, and provided with hot and cold baths. A septic tank system ensures the most sanitary conditions. H. F. Jones is the genial boniface, and W. W. Aldrege assists in looking after the patrons of the house and ministering to their wants.

## MAY SELL THE BONDS NOW

Council Takes Action On Initiative Petition for New Charter

\$27,000 BOND ISSUE IS ALSO AUTHORIZED

Expected That Denver Bond Firm Will Now Purchase the Bonds

At the council meeting Tuesday night an initiative petition signed by over eight per cent of the voters of the city, was presented, asking that the new charter and bond issue of \$27,000 of municipal water bonds be adopted by the city. The following action was taken:

Moved by Lynch and seconded by Hosch that the following resolution be adopted and passed: Whereas, an initiative petition signed by more than eight per cent of the legal electors of the city of Redmond, Oregon, asking that the proposed charter thereto annexed be submitted to the legal voters of said city at the next regular annual election, has been referred to the council of said city by the recorder thereof, with whom it was filed on the 5th day of September, 1911.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved; that the said proposed charter be and the same is hereby adopted and ordained as the charter of said city of Redmond, Oregon, and that the same shall be in full force and effect from and after the publication of this resolution in The Redmond Spokesman and the Oregon Hub, newspapers published in Redmond Oregon.

The question being upon the adoption and passage of the foregoing resolution the roll was called and the following vote taken:

Hosch, yes; Lynch, yes; Hoffman, yes; McCaffery, yes; White, yes. Wells, absent.

The above proceedings were taken at the suggestion of the bond company that has been negotiating with the city to buy the \$27,000 issue of bonds for the construction of the city water plant from the Deschutes river at Cline Falls. It is now anticipated that as soon as the bond company learns of the council complying with their wishes in the matter, the money from the sale of the bonds will be forthcoming, and work begun on the system as soon as bids are awarded.

### Boy Scouts Are Organized

J. H. Reder informs The Spokesman that he has organized a patrol of 12 boy scouts here, to be known as Boy Scouts of America, Troop No. 1. The commission for the troop has been received and drills will soon begin so as to get the scouts in readiness for the Railroad Celebration Day parade. Uniforms have been ordered.
