## J. W. BREWER IS ELECTED PREST.

Commercial Club Elected  
Officers for the En-  
suing Year

BUYS \$250 UNIFORM  
FOR THE BAND

Committee Outlining Plans  
for Railroad Day  
Celebration

At the meeting of the Com-  
mercial Club last night the fol-  
lowing officers were elected for  
the ensuing year:

Prest.—J. W. Brewer,  
Vice-Prest.—W. S. Rodman,  
Sec.—A. J. Haney,  
Treas.—G. M. Slocum,  
Executive Committee—Roy A.  
Bush, J. F. Bosch, Carl Ehret,  
H. C. Herrick.

The secretary's report showed  
receipts for the year of \$1,814.17  
and disbursements, \$1,743.50.

The matter of Railroad Day  
celebration was taken up, and a  
committee appointed to canvass  
the city for subscriptions, to as-  
certain how much could be raised  
for the event.

The executive committee re-  
ported they had ordered the band  
to procure suits costing \$250, the  
Commercial Club to pay for same.  
The band agreeing to take the  
suits as their pay for playing for  
the celebration, and the uniforms  
to belong to individual members  
of the band. This brought out  
considerable discussion, but the  
action of the executive commit-  
tee was finally ratified.

The matter of furnishing rock  
for a stone depot here was taken  
up, and Dobson and Brewer ap-  
pointed a committee to look  
further into the matter and con-  
sult with the Oregon Trunk offi-  
cials.

A special meeting of the club  
is called for next Wednesday  
night, and in the meantime the  
executive committee was in-  
structed to get busy and outline  
plans for the coming Railroad  
Day celebration.

The date for the above event  
has not been decided upon.  
President Gray of the Oregon  
Trunk has notified Mayor Jones  
that in all probability the road  
would be in position to run a spe-  
cial train to this point by October  
2d, and there was some talk of  
holding the celebration on that  
day, but as the Central Oregon  
Development League meets in  
Burns on that date and many of  
the railroad officials will attend,  
that date could not be consid-  
ered.

At the meeting next Wednes-  
day night it is expected a defi-  
nite date will have been agreed  
upon.

### GRIM WAYS IN GUINEA.

Skulls in Every House, and Enemies  
Killed in War Are Eaten.

Walter Goodfellow, who led a British expedition into Dutch New Guinea, says of the very primitive people found there: "The natives wear no clothing, but this needs to be qualified in the case of widows in mourning. At such time a woman is very much covered up. She wears elaborate grass clothes, like a long mantle, and has a thing resembling a huge poke bonnet over her head. She also paints her face with yellow ocher. The natives mourn for men, but not much for women. At the moment of death a great wailing or screaming is set up, and everybody covers himself with mud. The dead are always buried in the morning about an hour before daylight. During the night the whole village evidently sit up wailing. One would start off in a quivering voice high above all the other voices, and they would keep this up for hours and hours. The dirge or wailing song which they chanted was most impressive during the silence of the night, and the tap-tap-tap of the tom-tom accompanying it added to the effect. About an hour before daylight they would take the body off to bury it, and one heard this wailing with the regular tap-tap-tap of the tom-tom gradually dying away in the distance.

"In their huts they preserved the skulls of their relatives. Dr. Wal-laston and I went down another river and visited a very large vil-lage where we desired to collect some skulls. It was always rather difficult to establish trade at first, but after the first shyness had worn off we found the natives only too ready to sell the skulls they had. One woman brought out the skull of a child which she said was her own child and wished to sell it to us. Presently the whole village street looked like a Golgotha, all the people having put the skulls they owned outside their huts. They did not ask us to buy them, but they evidently hoped we would do so. Every house had three or four skulls set out in front of it. Another time a man brought the skull of his young wife to sell. It struck me as being a particularly gruesome sight, because he stood there for a long time with the skull under his arm.

"The natives seem to attach no importance to the lives of the women. We once saw a man drowning a woman and rescued her. We got her on to the bank, where she lay for some time before she was suffi-ciently recovered to get up and crawl away to the village. I could cite other examples to show that this is not an isolated instance of cruelty. Cannibalism is not prac-ticed by the Mimika people as a general custom, but enemies killed in warfare are eaten."—Chicago News.
