FINE NEW BUSINESS BUILDING FINISHED

Muma Building on Corner
6th and F Sts. Credit to the City

One of the finest wooden buildings, and the best constructed in Redmond, is the Muma store building on the corner of 6th and F streets. The build is 26x70, two stories, with 12-foot ceilings on both floors.

The lower floor has been designed for a store room, and is well lighted and appointed. The second floor was built purposely for lodge purposes, and has all the necessary ante and paraphernalia rooms. The floor is solidly built, 2x16 joists with three rows of bridging having been used. The floor is deadened so that any noise from above cannot be heard below.

The entire building is plumbed for city water, and wired for electric lights, is plastered throughout, and handsomely painted inside and out to present an attractive appearance.

VELOCITY OF LIGHT.

One of Jupiter's Moons Showed the Way to Compute it.

The speed at which light travels, through space was discovered almost by accident 250 years ago. It grew out of an irregularity in the movement of one of Jupiter's moons. At one period of the year this moon was sixteen minutes and thirty-six seconds behind time—that is, behind the time table it had kept six months before. This moon would disappear behind Jupiter and at times be sixteen minutes and thirty-six seconds late in reappearing.

In other words, the time table Jupiter's moon kept in spring was different from the one it kept in fall. It is important to note that the variation occurred every six months regularly. Every half year the moon would be this quarter of an hour late in coming out from behind its parent planet, Jupiter. This periodicity explained the irregularity, for the distance between us and Jupiter varies every six months, and the moon appeared late in making its appearance because its light had a greater intervening space to travel over in coming to us.

Suppose you are on a merry-go-round and a big arc light is at one side of it. At times as you ride around you will be near the arc light and at times removed to the opposite side of the circle. When you are on the opposite side the light will have to cross the circle to reach you. To cross the circle in which the earth moves is a distance of 186,000,000 miles. Hence astronomers saw it took the light of Jupiter's moon sixteen minutes and thirty-six seconds to travel 186,000,000 miles. The sixteen minutes and thirty-six seconds are about equal to 1,000 seconds. Therefore the rate at which light travels is 186,000,000 miles divided by 1,000, or 186,000 miles per second. That this is true modern machines clearly show.—Louisville Courier-Journal.
