## FARM TRAIN IS HERE NOV. 2

Potato Show and Creamery Meeting Held On the Same Date

LARGE ATTENDANCE IS EXPECTED HERE

Agricultural College Professors Will Come With the Farm Train

The committee having in charge the arranging of a date for holding the Redmond Potato Show and the meeting of dairy-men to form an association for this section of the county, have decided to hold these events on the day the O. W. R. & N. Co.'s demonstration train arrives here, which is Thursday, Nov. 2nd. All of the farmers and ranchers in this section of the county have been invited to bring in exhibits of their potatoes for the Potato Show, and it is expected

that a large number will be on hand with their products.

The forming of a dairymen's association for this section means much for the ranchers of the Redmond District and territory adjacent and from present indications a large number interested in this industry will be present.

Schedules for the movement of the farming demonstration train of the O. W. R. & N. Company through Crook, Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow counties in conjunction with the Oregon Agricultural College and Experiment Station have been completed and provide for stops at 13 enterprising cities and towns.

The train will leave Portland Sunday night, October 29, and will make the following stops: Monday, October 30—Lone, 8 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.; Heppner, 1 p. m. to 5 p. m.

Tuesday, October 31—Condon, 8 a. m. to 12 m.; Clem, 1:20 p. m. to 5:20 p. m.; Arlington, 7 p. m. to 11 p. m.

Wednesday, Nov. 1—Grass Valley, 8 a. m. to 11 a. m.; Moro, 12 m. to 2:15 p. m.; Wasco, 3 p. m. to 6 p. m.

Thursday, Nov. 2—Bend, 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.; Redmond, 1:30 p. m. to 5:30 p. m.

Friday, Nov. 3—Culver, 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.; Metolius, 1 p. m. to 5 p. m.

Saturday, Nov. 4—Madras, 10 a. m. to 2 p. m.

R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the O. W. R. & N. company, who has sent a number of demonstration trains into other parts

of the state and who believes thoroughly in the agricultural possibilities of the territory thru which the train will operate, has been working for the past few weeks to equip this one with all the appliances necessary to give the farmers who visit valuable information that will assist them in the development of their lands.

The following instructors from the State Agricultural College will be on board and will discuss with the farmers all questions that pertain to soil culture and scientific crop raising.

Dr. James Withycombe, director; Professor H. D. Scudder, dry farming expert; Professor F. L. Kent, dairy husbandman; Prof. James Dryden, poultry husbandman; Prof. E. L. Potter, animal husbandman; Robert Withycombe, superintendent Eastern Oregon Experiment Station; H. Umberger, superintendent Moro Dry Farm Station; Orran Beatty, traveling agricultural adviser.

A. A. Morse, special agent of the traffic department of the O. W. R. & N. Company, will have charge of the train. Mr. Miller will also be on board. He will be accompanied by the following officials: F. W. Robinson, general freight agent; Wm. McMurray, general passenger agent; Hugh O'Neill, traveling freight and passenger agent in the Deschutes district; H. C. Oliver, traveling freight and passenger agent.

The schedule has been arranged.

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## THREE DAYS OF GOOD RACING

Meet Will Be Here Friday, Saturday and Monday, Oct. 20-23

NOTED HORSES ARE TO RACE EACH DAY

Best Race Meet Ever Held in Redmond Promised Patrons

Redmond is to have a three days' race meet—Friday, Saturday and Monday, October 20-21-23, and preparations have been made to make this meet the best one by all odds ever held in the city. The affair is in charge of a citizens committee, and three good races will be run each day. The committee having the affair in charge is Mayor Jones, James Dougherty and J. F. Hosch, with Dave Miller as official starter.

Thirty horses that have been racing on the Oregon circuit at Salem, Eugene, La Grande and Pendleton are now here, and nine more that were in races at Prineville will take part in the events. Local horses will also compete for the purses to be hung up.

Over \$600 in purses have been guaranteed, which will ensure a good lot of races. Races will be started at 1:30 each day. Following is the list of races:

Friday—First race, 1 mile handicap, for 3-year olds and up. Second race—One-fourth mile dash, high weight handicap.

Third race—Five-eighth mile, purse race.

Saturday—First race, Three-quarter mile, handicap, 3-year olds and up.

Second race—Harness race, trot or pace, free for all, best two in three.

Third race—Three eighth mile, handicap, light weight.

Monday—First race, Three-quarter mile, handicap, 3-year olds and up.

Second race—One-quarter mile dash. Purse for non-winners.

Third race—One-half mile, free for all. Every horse eligible.
