

## RILEY BOUGHT GUN TO KILL LOUIS LONG

### Defense Basing Rebuttal on Long's Persistent Detaining of Woman

A Prineville dispatch says: Little progress has been made today in the trial of J. L. Riley, which began before Judge Bradshaw in the circuit court last week.

Gradually the state is weaving a web of evidence about J. L. Riley, who recently killed Pugilist Louis Long near Redmond, which will be exceedingly difficult to disentangle, and a verdict of guilty in the first degree is considered almost certain. Evidence showing purchase of the gun and ammunition at Madras before the start of the sensational dash by Riley's auto is cited as conclusively proving the premeditated malice necessary to a first degree verdict.

The defense is not endeavoring to deny the essential fact of murder, but it is expected it will show that Long was so aggressively aggressive in his efforts to prevent Helen Riley from returning to Portland with her husband that Riley was justified in what he did. It was not denied that at all times when Riley and his wife were in Central Oregon they lived in houses of ill fame, both at Redmond and Opal City.

### Tells Public They Should Hear This Famous Orator And Statesman

When the conflict opened, he enlisted in defense of his adopted country and was in many hard battles. At the close of the war he went to Mexico and helped to establish her independence. Here he officiated at the death of Maximilian, who was the one who exiled him and his mother from Austria years before.

Returning to the United States he settled in Minnesota and was elected to sit in the Legislature and help make her laws.

Years ago he was found to be one of the most entertaining lecturers on any subject, and went into that field. He has spoken in every state of the Union and made a trip to England, Ireland and Scotland.


