CUT FREIGHT AID TO CENTRAL OREGON

Fuel Rates to This Section
Are Reduced by
Railroads

Fuel prices in Central Oregon will be materially reduced as a result of the wood and coal tariffs just announced by the O.-W. R. & N. and Oregon Trunk roads.

Effective November 1 the rate on coal from Rock Springs, Wyo., the base of most local supply, will be \$5.50 a ton to Madras and \$5.75 a ton to Redmond. The present rate to Madras is \$6.25. These rates, it is believed, will enable dealers in Central Oregon cities to sell coal at Portland prices.

The coal rate from Centralia, Wash., where much fuel is obtained, will be \$4.25 to Madras and \$4.50 to Redmond, corresponding rates to intermediate points.

The lumber rates from Redmond and Bend to Eastern common points will be the same as those from Portland to the same points.
