mated that not all of that amount will be required to install the gravity system and pipe the whole city, putting in standard 6-inch fire hydrants in the business and residence districts, and otherwise establishing an up-to-date water plant for the city.

The system after completion would be very economical. The maintenance charges would be only nominal. One man could look after the whole system.

The proposition is to obtain the water from the main canal of the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. This water comes direct from the Deschutes river near Bend, and according to physicians and others who have tested the water, the purity of the water is good.

It is proposed to install a filtering plant at the reservoir which will make the water as pure as can be obtained from any water plant in the country. So it will be seen that there can be no question as to the consumer getting pure, wholesome water.

The plan is to build a reservoir about three miles from the city and keep it full of water from the canal. Sufficient water will be stored to meet the demands of the city for a number of years, and a good fire pressure obtained.

C. E. ENGINEERS LOCATE LINE

Party Has Been Working Between Here and the Sisters Country

SUPPOSED TO BE SURVEYING OLD LINE

Railroad Rumors Again Rife That Redmond May Be Junction

During the past few months several surveying crews have been in the field between this city and Sisters, and a few weeks ago a crew of surveyors were working four miles west of here near the old line of the Corvallis & Eastern R. R. survey.

The surveyors and engineers were in the employ of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad company, for they cashed checks here given by the above company, and made no secret that they were an engineering party. Further than that no definite information could be obtained from them as to what line they were surveying or what their purpose was.

But the fact that the Corvallis & Eastern railroad has had engineers in this section leads to the belief that the Harriman people, to whom the Corvallis & Eastern now belongs, are checking up the old surveys made some years ago by the Corvallis & Eastern when it was an independent line.

Three surveys were made by that road. One crossing the Deschutes river at Laidlaw, another crossing the river near Cline Falls and entering Redmond, and another north of this city. It has been stated by those well posted on the matter, that the most feasible site for the Corvallis & Eastern crossing is near Cline Falls.

Since the completion of the Oregon Trunk railroad to this city, and the leasing of the track of this road from Culver to Bend by the Harriman people for a period of 99 years, it is stated that an outlet over the mountains for the Corvallis & Eastern and connection with the Deschutes road, the Harriman line that runs from the Columbia river to Bend, has been desired. Redmond has always been mentioned as the junction point of these two roads, and from the activity that has been shown the past season in checking up the old surveys of the Corvallis & Eastern it looks as if something in railroad building would be done before many months, and Redmond made the junction of the Corvallis & Eastern and the Deschutes railroad.

WILL LOCATE MILL NEARER REDMOND

J. P. Duckett Intends to Establish His Sawmill Near Railroad

J. P. Duckett, who recently bought the Roberts sawmill at Sisters, was in Redmond last Thursday in company with E. M. Ashmore, who is connected with him in the milling business. Mr. Duckett stated he intended to move the sawmill from Sisters nearer to Redmond and in closer proximity to timber. He expects to have the mill located and in running operation in a few weeks. The capacity of the mill is from 20,000 to 25,000 feet daily. It is Mr. Duckett's intention to manufacture shingles in the spring, and he will turn out first-class lumber as far as manufacturing the product is concerned. Mr. Duckett is an experienced sawmill and lumber man, having had many years experience in the business, and he promises the people of this section a good grade of goods at a reasonable price.
