

CITY ELECTION DECEMBER 4

Three Councilmen Are to Be Elected at That Time

WHITE, WELLS, LYNCH ARE THE HOLDOVERS

Candidates Beginning to Be Mentioned for the Offices

The first election in Redmond to be held under the new charter will be held Monday, December 4th. At this time three councilmen are to be elected to take the place of the outgoing councilmen whose term of office expires at this time.

The three outgoing councilmen are Huffman, McCaffery and Hosh, and the hold over councilmen are White, Wells and Lynch. But ten days remain before election. Several names have been mentioned as good timber for councilmen to be voted for, but so far no one has actually declared himself a candidate, and it is expected that a ticket or tickets will not be put in the field until a few days before election.

A caucus has been called for Friday, tomorrow night, to be held at the Commercial Club room to nominate candidates for the offices to be filled.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

At the meeting of the city council Tuesday night all members were present with the exception of F. M. White.

The following bills were allowed:

The application of Zumwalt & Miller for a saloon license for the balance of 1911 was received and granted.

A motion made by Wells and seconded by Hosh was carried that the marshal should see that the ordinance governing saloons was rigidly enforced, and also be instructed to see that all pimps and professional gamblers were notified to leave the city.

At the suggestion of the recorder a motion was carried that sealed bids be called for from the two papers here for publication of legal printing for the city during year 1912. Bids to be opened Tuesday night, Nov. 28th.

G. E. Woodward, J. L. McDowell and C. Hammond were appointed judges of election, and J. H. Mendenhall and D. L. Miller, clerks.

City Engineer Woodward reported on the new proposed water system. He stated he had figured on the cost of a gravity water system, which would amount to about \$29,000. A system which would pump from the Deschutes river into a reservoir at Forked Horn Butte, costing about the same, and a system of a 100,000 gallon to be erected in the city, water to be pumped from the river at Cline Falls. No definite action was taken on the reports.

The recorder was instructed to procure the necessary books and supplies for the proper conduct of the city's business.

G. M. Huffman, of the street and alley committee, reported that an alley in the business section of the city was in bad condition, and the matter was given attention and steps taken to abate the nuisance.

\$1000 Reward Is Offered

A thousand dollars reward is offered by the Spokane, Portland and Seattle R. R. for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer of brakeman W. H. Shane, who was killed at Butler, Wn., on the night of November 14th. The description of the murderer is as follows: Looks like an Indian, height 5 feet, 6 inches, long black hair, weight 155 pounds, wore black Stetson soft hat, dark blue shirt, black trousers, black shoes and storm rubbers, and brown Mackinaw.
