MISREPRESENTS THIS SECTION

Great Northern Publication Advertising Central Oregon Does Not Give True Statement Regarding This Section of the State---Redmond Is Discriminated Against Throughout the Publication.

The publication entitled "Oregon", recently issued by the Great Northern railroad, and given widespread distribution all over the United States, professes to deal largely with the central part of the state, and the section through which the Oregon Trunk railroad runs.

The publication is profusely illustrated with farm scenes and other views, and the location of some of the farms are given wrong. For instance: In every description of pictures of the Powell Buttes section, showing cultivated farms and ranches, the book states "in the Powell Butte country, near Bend."

This is a glaring misrepresentation or else a mistake on the part of the compiler of the publication. The Powell Butte country is tributary to Redmond. It is from 6 to 8 miles from Redmond, and 22

miles from Bend, and it is a long stretch of imagination to make the Powell Butte section near Bend.

In the write-up of Redmond in the publication, a description of the city that was published in railroad literature three years ago is used. Here is what is said about this city:

"Redmond is about four miles from the Deschutes River. It is on an elevation of about 3,000 feet. The Oregon Trunk Railway runs through Redmond. Redmond is five years old, and is a progressive town, with a newspaper, two banks, modern stores and an active commercial club. There is a good opening for another hotel, a steam laundry and jewelry store in Redmond."

TWO TICKETS IN THE FIELD

Caucuses Friday Night Place in Nomination Three Councilmen

MUCH INTEREST IS MANIFESTED

One Ticket Is the Citizens Ticket, Other Independent Ticket

Two caucuses were held last Friday night, and two sets of candidates nominated for city councilmen to be voted for at the election December 4th. The first caucus, for which a call had been published, was held in the Commercial Club room. Mayor Jones called the meeting to order and G. M. Slocum was elected chairman, and I. P. Hewitt, secretary.

The following names were put in nomination: Roy A. Bush, W. H. Anderson, J. F. Hosch, Dave Miller, W. H. Hobbs, C. H. Irvin, Dr. Rodemeyer. The vote was as follows:

J. F. Hosch, 78.
Roy A. Bush, 61.
W. H. Anderson, 56.
Dave Miller, 10.
W. H. Hobbs, 27.
C. H. Irvin, 20.
Dr. Rodemeyer, 6.

Hosch, Bush and Anderson having received the highest number of votes were declared the nominee of the caucus. There were 86 votes cast. It was, on motion, decided to call the ticket the Citizens Ticket.

After the adjournment of the first caucus another one was held in the same place. W. E. Young was elected chairman, and W. C. Walker, secretary. Four names were put in nomination, W. H. Hobbs, Isaac Buckley, J. F. Hosch and R. C. Immele. Twenty-five votes were cast and Hobbs, Buckley and Hosch were declared the nominees. The ticket was called the Independent Ticket.

TAXPAYERS OPPOSE BOUNTY PAYMENTS

Crook County Pays \$8443 in 2 Years for Killing Wild Animals

A dispatch from Prineville says: Owing to the fact that Crook county has expended \$8,443.50 for scalp bounties since July 1, 1909, or since the present scalp bounty law went into effect, sentiment is much adverse to the proposed extension of the provisions of the law increasing the bounty on coyotes, lynxes, cougars, bobcats and wolves.

Of this sum \$6,622.50 has been expended for coyote scalps, \$1,706 for bobcat scalps, \$110 for cougar scalps and \$5 for wolf scalps. Since the Oregon game and fish commission announced its intention of proposing an increase in the bounties marked opposition to the proposal has arisen. It is difficult to make the taxpayers of this county see that the large expenditure made by them and made necessary under the present law have been justifiable in view of the results obtained.
