R. R. OFFICIALS ON INSPECTION

Oregon Trunk Officers Are Well Pleased With Showing Made

The following Oregon Trunk railroad officials were in Redmond Tuesday on their way back to Portland after an inspection of the line from the Columbia river as far as Bend:

C. R. Gray, president; W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent; J. Russell, general superintendent; J. P. Rogers, superintendent; J. T. Hardy,

traveling freight and passenger agent, and R. P. Smith, assistant freight and passenger agent of the Great Northern railroad.

In talking of the business handled by the Oregon Trunk since the opening of the road for freight and passenger service November first, the officials expressed themselves well satisfied with the outlook, and were especially enthusiastic over the showing made at this station. The Redmond station has taken in more money for freight and passenger receipts than any other station on the line, and the freight shipments to this point have been greater than all the other stations on the line put together.

IRRIGATION WORK TO BE CHECKED UP

Field Engineer to Go Over Central Ore. Irrigation Co. Project

R. C. Wygant, field assistant to the desert land board, left Salem last week for an inspection trip through Central Oregon, during which time he will go over and check up the work of the Central Oregon Irrigation company's project in this section. It was as a result of Engineer Wygant's investigations on this project for the desert land board that Manager J. Roscoe Howard made the statement to the board that Wygant had done more harm in Central Oregon than any other two men in that, as Howard claimed, he had made false and misleading statements.

At the time these charges were made, Wygant's reports were proven to be correct. This trip is to check up the new work which Manager Howard stated he was doing. He will meet the settlers of the Water User's associations and talk to them in re-

gard to the project. Probably 60 settlers will come before him to submit evidence of proof. In taking this testimony, Wygant will also personally inspect the settlers' claims.

During the first few days of his trip Engineer Wygant will have charge of the river hydraulics for the fish and game commission under Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton for the Oregon Central Fish Hatchery at Bonneville, on the Columbia river in eastern Multnomah county. A lot of fish ponds are being constructed there and Tanner creek is being harnessed to supply water and power for the enlargement of the present hatchery. The capacity of the hatchery is being doubled so the capacity will be 16,000,000 fish.
