Work has been resumed on the stone depot here the Oregon Trunk is building. A large crew is at

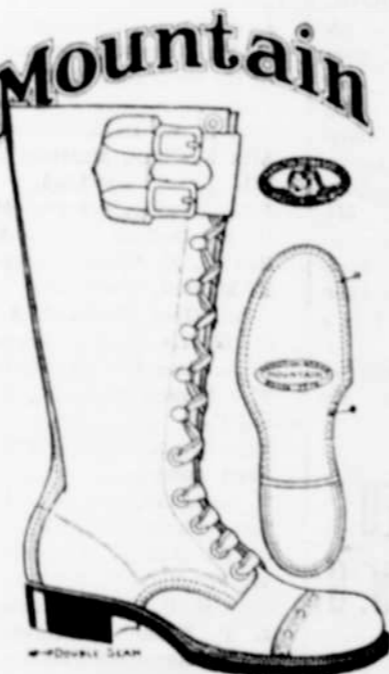
