

TO GENERATE MORE "JUICE"

PLANS BEING WORKED OUT TO GREATLY INCREASE ELECTRICAL PLANT HERE FOR LIGHT AND POWER—WILL BE INCREASED ON UNIT SYSTEM

If plans which are now being worked out can be successfully carried through, Redmond will soon have an electrical plant that will furnish all the power and light needed for some time to come, on a 24-hour service plan.

Engineers are now figuring on the probable cost of installing an electrical plant on the unit system, and getting data as to the amount of "juice" that will be used for light and power in the city during the present year.

One firm that desires to put in an ice plant and cold storage system here will take from 12 to 15 horse power 15 hours a day, and there are a number of other plants that will take smaller amounts.

So far it has been figured that the plant can be installed and operated by gasoline on a paying basis, with reasonable charges to consumers.

That the proposed plant will soon be in operation there is little question, as those desiring power for the ice plant must have same by the latter part of April. It is expected that the final plans will be worked out this week, and a decision arrived at.
