

WANT FARMERS TO RAISE OREGON CORN

In the firm belief that corn can be made as profitable in Oregon if care is taken in the selection of proper varieties, Representative Hawley has taken the matter up with the Secretary of Agriculture, with the result that the Secretary has sent him the following request:

"If you will furnish me with the names and addresses of a few farmers who would be interested in experimenting with a few varieties of corn, I will have our office of corn investigations take the matter up with them directly and arrange with them for testing some of the earlier varieties of New England, Minnesota and the Dakotas.

Hawley desires the names of farmers in Oregon willing to take up this experiment work, confident that a thorough test will discover one or more of the earlier maturing varieties suitable to Oregon's climate.

Representative Hawley, as a member of the House agricultural committee, has taken a deep interest in securing grains and grasses suitable to Oregon's climate and soil, and believes this offer of the secretary must result beneficially to the agriculturists of his State.

Olcott Gives Pony for Fowl Display

Secretary of State Olcott, being interested in the statewide country life education movement inaugurated by the state bankers' association and State Superintendent Alderman, announced that he would be glad to offer a Shetland pony as a prize for the child over 12 years of age who exhibits the best display of chickens. Interest is widespread in this movement and over half a hundred fine animals have been given as prizes. Among those to be won by the boys and girls of Oregon are Shetland ponies, Pendleton Indian ponies, thoroughbred calves, pure bred sheep, goats and hogs, and choice strain of chickens and dogs. Over \$1000 in cash prizes will also be offered.
