300 DAIRY COWS FOR THIS SECTION

Ranchers Are Taking a Decided Interest in Dairying and Will Soon Increase Their Herds With Good Grade of Stock.

Manager Meyer of the Redmond Creamery, in his travels around the county in the interest of the creamery has found that the ranchers are taking a decided interest in dairying since the creamery has been established at Redmond.

securing of more and better dairy cows. Nearly all of the ranchers are desirous of increasing and bettering their herds, and to this point Mr. Meyer has lent his aid. He is in close touch with dairymen in the Willamette Valley who have whole dairy herds of good cows for sale, ranging in price from \$50 to \$65. Mr. Meyer has made arrangements to bring in several car loads of these cows, and will do so if parties in different sections of the county wanting cows will select some good dairyman in their locality to go with him to the Willamette Valley and help select the stock. It is expected that within two months over 300 good tested dairy cows will be brought into this section to increase the herds already here. Arrangements have been made so that cows can be sold on satisfactory terms to buyers. Meetings of ranchers and those interested in dairying will shortly be held in different parts of the county for the selection of a responsible dairyman to accompany Mr. Meyer to purchase the stock, and for the prospective buyers to sign up for the number of cows they desire to buy.

LOCAL PHONE CO. GETS LONG DISTANCE LINES

New Arrangement Gives Company a Wide Scope of Territory.

The board of directors of the Deschutes Mutual Telephone Co. have completed financial arrangements to put in a complete metallic circuit line from Redmond to Prineville, connecting with the Independent system there. The Deschutes Co. will also put in thirty phones in the Powell Butte district immediately, and have assurances that twenty more phones will be used before the first of the year. It is the intention to get the Prineville connection completed by court week, the first of May, if possible. Work on the system has already been commenced, and the company has ample funds at its disposal to carry through the project. With the Laidlaw system and the Independent system the Deschutes Mutual Co. will have free exchange with Laidlaw, Redmond, Powell Butte, Terrebonne, and Deschutes over 299 phones. There will be 500 phone connections on the entire system. By the new arrangement the long distance line will reach to Prineville, Burns, Spray, Fossil, Mitchell, Shaliko, Lamonta, Culver, Metollus, Madras, and clear through to The Dalles by way of the Agency Plains line.

DAM AND CANAL WILL BE BUILT RAPIDLY

Four Months' Time Is Given for Big Irrigation Job on Deschutes River.

The Central Oregon Irrigation Company has let the contract for a solid concrete dam across the Deschutes river for the North Canal and that contractor will also build the first two miles of the North Canal for the company. The contract provides that the dam and canal must be completed as far as the work is covered in the undertaking, within four months from the date of the contract. Gerde, who built the Peninsula tunnel in Portland, has shown by several jobs he has had that he can work at record speed, and his agreement to finish this contract satisfies the company that it will be done on time. The camp for the workmen in the contractor's employ has been established and diamond drills have been in use for some days in testing the foundation rock for the dam. The letting of this contract is of great importance to this part of the state.

WORK ON CANAL STARTED

it is understood. With 275 second feet going to the Pilot Butte canal, a balance will remain of 725 second feet. Of this amount, 114 second feet will be delivered to the Central Oregon canal lands, to reinforce its capacity in the eastern portion of the segregation. Pending the completion of the eastern section of the North Canal this 114 feet will be taken through the Pilot Butte ditch. The balance of 611 second feet, remaining from the delivery of the North Canal flume, will be devoted to irrigating lands properly under that ditch segregation, or about 50,000 acres. The total amount of land under the North Canal, as approved for sale and already sold, is 26,007 irrigable acres and 9,286 waste land acres. The total irrigable acres is 65,226, and the total waste lands 38,191 acres, making 103,417 acres under the North Canal which the company has applied for.
