not be used. At Deschutes an ideal location for the irrigation work was found, but owing to the lack of settlement at that point at present it was thought best to locate in a more populous district.  
It is planned to do co-operative work near Bend, at Deschutes, in the vicinity of La Pine and near Hampton Buttes. The work begins at once. Plans for laying out and cropping the two farms, varieties and methods to be used and demonstrations to be made are already prepared by Professor Scudder. Though the time is short it is hoped to do much toward solving Crook county problems.

**COUNTY FAIR DESIRES  
CHILDREN'S EXHIBITS**

J. P. Cadie, secretary of the Crook County Fair, was here last week and stated to The Spokesman that it was the intention this year to make the county fair more popular than formerly. One of the innovations will be the showing of agricultural and industrial exhibits of the school children, and he urges that all school children interest themselves in the matter so as to make a creditable exhibit at the fair this fall. The fair management and the railroads will give suitable and substantial prizes for exhibits, and it is the intention to make the children's exhibits one of the drawing cards at the annual fairs. Mr. Cadie is an experienced man in the management of fairs, and he is now working along lines that will, without question, popularize the Crook County Fair.

**COCHRAN IS  
RUNNING WELL**

Geo. T. Cochran, Republican Candidate for Congressional Nomination, Meeting With Favor from Water Users.

A significant feature of the race for the Republican congressional nomination in the Eastern Oregon district is the attitude of the Republican newspapers in Umatilla county, the home of Judge W. R. Ellis. The Pendleton Live Wire, the only Republican daily in Umatilla county is lending aggressive support to the candidacy of George T. Cochran of La Grande. The Stanfield Standard has adopted the same policy, and the Pilot Rock Record, the only other avowed Republican paper in the county, is maintaining a neutral attitude. In the east end of the same county, the Freewater Times, independent, has dropped its active support of Jerry Rusk and speaks kindly of Mr. Cochran.

Farmers and water-users throughout Eastern Oregon, according to statements issued from George T. Cochran's headquarters, are rallying to Cochran's standard in the Republican congressional campaign. His activities as water superintendent for the same district have earned him scores of warm friends and brought him in personal contact with almost every rancher in the immense area. Through them he has gained first-hand knowledge of Eastern Oregon's greatest problem—irrigation—and he devotes much space to this important subject in his platform, pledging himself to work faithfully to place irrigation and reclamation on the same basis as rivers and harbors and declaring that "the application of water to the land is of benefit not only to the people of the state but to the people of the nation. It is just, therefore, that the products of the soil, which largely constitutes the commerce of the West, be deemed of equal importance with the improvement of our great waterways, which only facilitates the transportation of our commerce."

Born on a farm in Union county in 1877, George T. Cochran, Republican congressional candidate, gained his education in Oregon schools and Stanford university, served his government nearly four years in the Philippines and engaged in the practice of law at La Grande until he became water superintendent for Eastern Oregon, in which position he has been brought in daily personal contact with the great problems of irrigation. This splendid fund of experience, backed by a good, clean record in public and private life, he offers in the service of Eastern Oregon.
