## WATER WORKS NOW ASSURED

Redmond is now assured of a fine gravity water system to cost \$36,470. At a council meeting held this week Causey & Co. of Denver, agreed to accept \$35,000 of 20 year city bonds, and the project is now in such shape that work on the reservoir and pumping plant at the Deschutes river will begin at once. Jeffery & Buffton of Portland, are

the contractors who will put in the system, and they state that they will begin assembling the material here at once for the construction of the plant.

There is nothing now in the way to hinder the water works system, and the contractors have signified their intention of pushing the work along as fast as possible.

## MORE DAIRY COWS COMING

**Dairy Meeting Last Saturday Well Attended and Orders for Good red Dairy Cows Placed—Ranchers Interested in the Dairying Industry**

The dairy meeting called by Mr. Meyer of the Redmond Creamery Co. last Saturday afternoon for the purpose of selecting a good dairyman to accompany him to the Valley to purchase cows, was well attended and very successful.

Great interest was shown at the meeting, thus proving that the people realize that dairying is the only dependable industry for this section.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Meyer, who outlined the plan of getting cows. J. W. Brown of Laidlaw, was selected to go with him to purchase the cows. Mr. Brown hails from the Valley, where he formerly owned a large dairy ranch, and consequently is very able to assist Mr. Meyer in making the proper selection.

J. W. Brewer of the Bank of Commerce, was present at the meeting and stated that his bank was willing to assist the ranchers in stocking up with dairy cows. He also outlined the plan by which the bank would advance the money. A man wanting cows must make a deposit of \$5 per cow. Then when the cows get here he must sign a contract agreeing to pay \$5 each month on the cow until paid for; this \$5 to be taken out of the cream check, one-half of it every two weeks. This plan seemed very liberal and satisfactory

to all. That afternoon 57 cows were signed up, and since then the number has increased to 73.

The Redmond Bank of Commerce has taken much interest in the matter of getting good cows into the country and have encouraged every effort to that end. The bank has already placed about 60 cows with the farmers, and has now made definite arrangements to place 250 additional; and with the co-operation of Mr. Meyer of the local creamery will have these cows with the farmers within two weeks.

The bank deserves much credit for what it has done in this line, as it is apparent that the dairy business is one of the coming industries of this section.

Mr. Brewer, president of the bank, will leave for Portland Friday morning for the purpose of completing the financial arrangements, and Mr. Meyer and Mr. Brown will leave the first of next week to buy the cows.

Mr. Meyer and Mr. Brown will go to the Valley shortly. If there are any others wanting cows they should see Mr. Meyer immediately, as he has room for a few more to make three carloads.

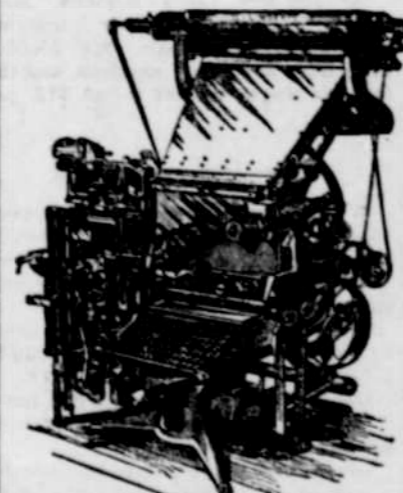
## SPOKESMAN IN ORGANIZATION ITS NEW HOME IS PERFECTED

**Poultry Men of This Section Held Meeting Last Friday and Put Association On Good Working Basis—Officers Are Elected for Year**

At a meeting of poultry men held here last Friday afternoon a permanent organization was perfected and a constitution and by laws were adopted.

The name of the Redmond Poultry Association was adopted, and any poultry raiser is eligible to membership by paying the initiation fee of one dollar.

The purpose of the association is to promote the raising of high bred fowls, to better the market conditions for the sale of poultry and its products and to enable the members to buy their poultry supplies more economically.

The next meeting will be held the first Saturday in May at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and all poultry people in this section are urged to attend and become members of the association.
