**EXPERIMENT FARMS**

(Continued from 1st page)

Make known to those superintendents what special problems in tillage or cropping your neighborhood is interested in, state that you are willing to devote a half acre or more of your land lying adjacent to a main traveled road to demonstration work and that you will furnish the tools and put in and take care of a certain amount of crop under the directions of the superintendents, describe the location of your land and ask for a visit.

A letter of this kind directed to either of the superintendents will receive immediate consideration. As far as it is possible so to do, a visit will be made to the different neighborhoods, a certain amount of seed furnished to the co-operator, instructions given and later visits made—the crop harvested, of course going to the co-operator, but a record of the operation and yield going to the superintendent of the farms.

While it may not be possible to do all of the co-operative work the present year that may be desired, yet the college experts will use every effort to make the funds go as far as possible. It is especially desired that representative co-operative fields, even if only of small size, be started in the following sections of the county:

**Dry Farming Section**—Agency Plains, Culver, Lamonta, the Squaw Creek and Sisters country, Combs Flat east of Prineville, Powell Butte, Bear Creek Butte, the Hampton Buttes and the Ireland Valley country.

**Irrigated Section**—Squaw Creek, Laidlaw, Deschutes, Bend, Powell Butte, La Pine, Prineville, Redmond and upper Crooked river sections.

These co-operative trials will be little or no expense to the individuals undertaking them, since sufficient seed may be raised in each case to reimburse the farmer for his work. Since the season is already late for starting dry farming demonstrations, it is probable that only the late crops will be handled the present season. Only such crops as dry land alfalfa, grain sorghums, potatoes and field peas will be attempted in the co-operative work this season in the dry farming co-operations. For these perhaps only half an acre of representative ground thoroughly summer fallowed last year and cultivated early this spring or perhaps seeded to wheat last fall, which could now be disked up, would be required. Four or five acres more of crops already

seeded might be used to demonstrate different methods of tillage for moisture conservation. The dry farmers, however, should get into immediate touch with the superintendent of the dry land demonstration farm at Metolius, as any co-operative work in this line must be started at once if at all. In the irrigated section it is probable that varieties of barley, oats, emmer, field peas, corn, grain sorghums, mangals, cow turnips, potatoes and onions may be tried. For these varieties perhaps not more than half an acre would be required in each of the sections suggested, and perhaps a couple of acres more of alfalfa or clover on which to test different amounts and frequency of irrigation, etc.

Later in the fall if the work is continued on the dry farm the various fall grain varieties will be seeded on the co-operative fields in the spring following the spring grains. Little can be done with small grains this spring on the dry farms owing to the lateness of the season; hence stress will be laid in the dry farming sections on the growing of alfalfa and field peas in cultivated rows for seed, and sorghum and corn for forage, and potatoes as a money crop.

After the seeding on the co-operative field is completed later visits to these fields will be made by the superintendents, at which times, if the farmers so desire, meetings can be held and the farmers' problems freely discussed on all sides, both by the expert and the farmers themselves.

Toward harvest special meetings of the farmers in the county will be called at the two demonstration stations that the work being done there can be studied and a round-up session and experience meeting held. Throughout the season visitors to the demonstration farms and to the co-operative fields will be heartily welcomed, and every assistance possible given to them. In the offices of the superintendents will be found libraries on dry farming and irrigated farming respectively, and some literature for distribution.

The superintendents will shortly announce the locations of their offices and office hours at which they may always be found. Every day in the year these superintendents can be reached by letter or telephone from farmers who wish advice or suggestions, and wherever it is possible and it would seem necessary, the superintendents will visit the farmers themselves.

Every farmer in Crook county is urged to make the fullest possible use of the two farms and the two superintendents in charge of them, and at the same time to give these superintendents their heartiest support and encouragement, for their work is by no means easy.

Certain men will fight, and we are all the more reasonable with them than we are with men we know will run.
