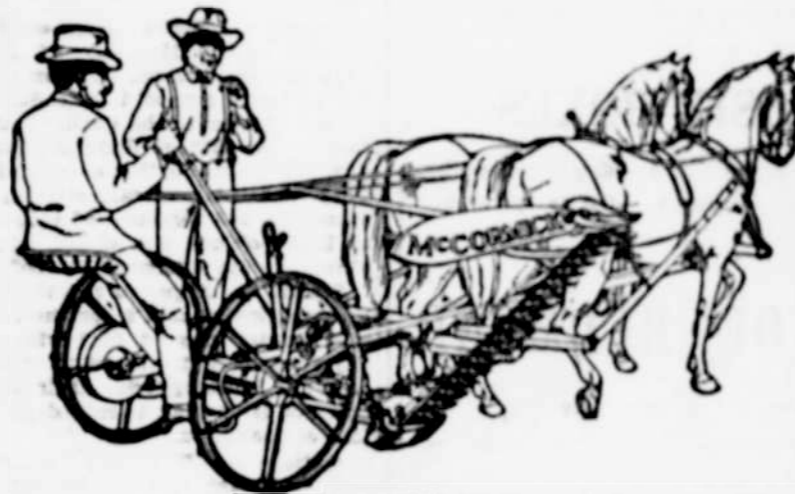

Water Measure

Do not allow water below the crest to back up even with the crest or confine air underneath, for this lessens the discharge.

Always set the weir perpendicular to and at right angles to the current. Never allow the pool above the weir to fill up with sediment. For the measurement of silt laden water or where the necessary fall cannot be obtained, a rating flume will be more desirable than a weir.
