## WEST'S WORK RESENTED

### Redmond Folks Say Town's Good Name Has Been Injured

The Portland Oregonian of Aug. 24th contained the following:  
H. F. Jones, ex-mayor, and other Redmond business men, who are in Portland for a few days, declare that the interference of a trio of self-appointed "reform" fanatics in a situation that defied official investigation caused Gov. West to be misled in his recent campaign to "clean up" Redmond.

Jones says he is the man against whom the governor's guns were directed, when West is supposed to have discovered an immoral wave sweeping through the city, and commanded Jones to resign.

But even regarding that resignation Jones has a word of explanation to make that it might be understood that he quit his office under fire. He wrote out his resignation and placed it in the hands of the council pending an investigation of the governor's charges that the town was wide open and that the mayor had "sat in" at a little poker game in which F. A. Dillon, one of the governor's hired detectives, also had a hand.

But, it seems that no sooner had the council the resignation in hand than a special meeting was called and the resignation was accepted together with that of Z. T. McClay, city marshal, a Jones appointee.

"This fellow Dillon came to town looking for trouble," said Jones. "I suspected him from the start and decided to see what he was up to. So, one night when I learned of a little freeze out game I sat in. I didn't see any money change hands and I could not learn what Dillon's game was. It was that hand of poker that Dillon reported to the governor and it was his evidence concerning that game that caused my arrest and conviction. I have appealed the case to the circuit court."

Jones, as well as other leading citizens of Redmond are not so much concerned over his personal interest in the situation as they are over the effect that the "reform" agitation is likely to have upon the business of the community. They declare that "the activity of the 'holier than thou' element is driving investors away."

Redmond is a town of 1200 people. They point out it should have at least 2000 inhabitants. Constant meddling with conditions that affect business, they say, has dwarfed the city. Redmond is in the center of one of the most productive regions in the northwest and is destined to be great in spite of the agitators, they declare.

"The morals of the town are good today and they always have been good. For that matter they are no better today than before Jones resigned," said one of the men yesterday. "We never had open gambling and don't have it now. We had no undesirable women at the time the governor threatened to send the militia to Redmond and we have none now."

"So the governor's statement that his recent reports from Redmond that the town has improved must be all wrong. It didn't have room to improve. The trouble is we have three or half a dozen well meaning but misguided old women of both sexes up there who would like to see the town conducted on puritanical lines."

"When Jones was mayor he gave what he called a fair, liberal administration. That is what the people want in Redmond as has been proved at repeated elections. They want law enforcement but they don't want blue laws imposed on them."

### ENGINEERS IN FIELD SOUTH OF BEND FOR O. W. R. & N.

Last Thursday night a party of O. W. R. & N. engineers passed thru here on the train enroute to Bend. In the same train were two baggage cars containing their outfit. This engineering party was met Saturday between Bend and LaPine by J. W. Brewer, Guy E. Dobson, Dr. Barr and H. Hanks who were returning via auto from Lakeview. The members of the engineering crew would not give out any information as to their occupation or destination, but it is known that the Harriman people are beginning to get busy with extension work of their east and west line across the state, and it is not a hard matter to dope it out that this party of engineers are going to begin work on the west end of the line.

### FIRE AT TERREBONNE DOES \$12,000 DAMAGE

A dispatch to the Portland Journal dated the 22d, says: Fire broke out in the ware house beside L. A. Heathman's store last night, consuming his entire stock of general merchandise, destroying the stone building belonging to George O'Neil in which the store was located, and burning down the Nelson building to the north. The cause of the fire is not known.

Heathman and his little son were sleeping in the warehouse and when they awoke the fire had rained such headway that it was impossible to put it out. The people of the town turned out in a body, but their efforts were unavailing in keeping the

fire from getting into the stone building by way of the roof. Wet blankets were used on the buildings across the street, saving them.

The total loss is about \$12,000, with \$4000 insurance. Heathman has ordered a new stock of goods and will resume business at once.
