PARCELS POST

THEN-FARMERS OF COUN-TRY DEMANDED IT

> The postoffice department has not yet fully outlined the measure. There will be many regulations to be made before it can be put into operation January 1, 1913. It is expected that the postmaster general will designate certain postal officials who will constitute a board, or bureau, to determine the rules and regulations board, by the aid of the interstate commerce commission, is empowered to change the classification of articles when the occasion seems to demand it. It will be along the line that much will have to be done, and er to construe the law in favor of the farmers or otherwise. District Attorney Wilson, after hearing a short statement of the case by Mr. Lane in the presence of the grand jury, said there was no cause for action against Mr. Jones; that Mr. Lane was legally married; and that the complaint bore evidence of malicious persecution against both Jones and Lane.
