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Many Ribbons for Powell Butte and Redmond Dists.

Twenty Six Blue Ribbons and Three Red Ribbons Captured at the County Fair at Prineville by the Above Districts on Exhibits of Grains, Vegetables and Fruit—Exhibits From These Districts Were Many and Attracted Much Attention From Fair Visitors—Redmond Schools Also Came in For a Share of Premiums

The Redmond and Powell Butte districts were well represented at the county fair at Prineville last week and took a number of premiums—26 firsts and three seconds on grains, fruit, vegetables and potatoes. Through the personal efforts of J. W. Brewer and R. C. Immele of this city, a large portion of the exhibits of the Redmond Potato Show and fair held here the week previous to the county fair, were taken to Prineville and entered. Mr. Brewer paying most of the entrance money out of his own pocket. The exhibit filled considerable space in the exhibition pavillion and added greatly to the attractiveness of that part of the fair. In fact, had it not been for the Redmond and Powell Butte exhibits the showing of grains, grasses, vegetables, fruit and potatoes at the fair would have been very meager. The silver cups won by the Redmond and Powell Butte people at the Potato Show here were also exhibited and attracted much attention. The fair officials did all they could to assist our exhibitors in making their display, and the courtesies extended were much appreciated. PARCELS POST JANUARY FIRST

NEW LAW BECOMES EFFECTIVE THEN—FARMERS OF COUNTRY DEMANDED IT

Bureau of the Department Will Make Regulations Governing Working of the Measure—Table of Rates Given

After many years of fighting the agricultural interests of the United States have succeeded in getting a start on the parcels post law. It is not all that has been contended for, but as an opening wedge it will no doubt prove monumental in its effect. During the long struggle the farmer has been opposed strongly by the express companies. If for no other reason, the session of congress just closed will ever remain one of great interest to the people. The measure was included in the general postoffice bill. It is founded on the zone system instead of the flat rate plan. That is, there is a graduated charge, according to distance, the charge increasing as the distance grows. Just what the effect will be remains to be seen. The postoffice department has not yet fully outlined the measure. There will be many regulations to be made before it can be put into operation January 1, 1913. It is expected that the postmaster general will designate certain postal officials who will constitute a board, or bureau, to determine the rules and regulations to govern the parcels post. This board, by the aid of the interstate commerce commission, is empowered to change the classification of articles when the occasion seems to demand it. It will be along the line that much will have to be done, and this bureau will have immense power to construe the law in favor of the farmers or otherwise. So great power has this board that they practically have entire charge of the measure. Senator Bourne, who was one of those interested in the bill, says: The postmaster general may make provision for indemnity insurance and collection on delivery with additional charges for such service; and may, with the consent of the interstate commerce commission, after investigation, modify rates, weights, and zone distances when experience

Large Crowd at the County Fair Held Last Week

Good Program Given During Entire Four Days, Consisting of Horse Racing, Aeroplane Flights, Band Concerts and Other Attractions—Stock Exhibit Was Interesting and the Agricultural Display Large—The Attendance Larger Than Ever Before in the History of the Fair—Redmond Well Represented

The county fair at Prineville that was held four days last week was the best ever held in Crook county, and attracted large crowds from all sections of the county and a number from outside the state. Many from this city and Powell Butte were in attendance daily. There were a number of good attractions each day. Perhaps one of the greatest attractions was the aeroplane flight made daily except Friday. The race card was well filled with good events, and the grand stand was thronged with people who like to see "the ponies run." In the stock department the exhibit was excellent, as was also the poultry exhibit. The band concerts were one of the attractions that pleased the large crowds. One commendable feature of the whole fair was the courteous manner in which visitors were treated, both by the fair officials and the townspeople. There was no overcharging by any of the hotels and restaurants for meals and lodging—the regular rates only being charged. Three regrettable incidents occurred during the fair. Stowell Cram, aged 83 years, was struck by the aeroplane and received injuries that caused his death. A squaw was seriously hurt in the pony race Friday, and P. W. Howard of Prineville, dropped dead on the race track from heart failure during the stock parade Saturday. People are ashamed of the clothes they wore last year and of their last year's habits. GRAND JURY THROWS THE LANE CASE OUT

The complaint made by a Redmond person against H. F. Jones, ex-mayor of Redmond, charging him when mayor, with illegally performing a marriage ceremony for Mr. and Mrs. Tim Lane of this city, was taken before the grand jury at Prineville yesterday. District Attorney Wilson, after hearing a short statement of the case by Mr. Lane in the presence of the grand jury, said there was no cause for action against Mr. Jones; that Mr. Lane was legally married; and that the complaint bore evidence of malicious persecution against both Jones and Lane.

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WANTS FRANCHISE FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT

It is understood that a Portland capitalist is in the city seeking a franchise from the council to put in electric light and power here, the "juice" to be generated at Cline Falls. The proposition is that if a franchise is granted material for the plant will be on the ground in two weeks and the system in operation in 60 days.
