### AN OPEN LETTER

Prineville, Ore., Oct. 1912.

MR. VOTER:

As the regular Republican nominee for the office of County Surveyor of your county, I am asking your support in the coming contest. My only opponent is Mr. Fred Rice, present incumbent and independent candidate, who went into the Republican primaries with me last spring, stating that he was a candidate "subject to the approval of the Republican voters of Crook county," and was beaten in a fair contest but now makes himself again a candidate in disregard of the spirit of direct primary law and of the wishes of his party.

I am a civil engineer with 6 years experience, including experience as a deputy county surveyor in Crook and also in other counties in Oregon. I feel that I am competent to fill the position which I seek, and am prepared to give it my fullest attention, keeping at all times a man at the office to advise with road petitioners and others having business with the county surveyor.

Mr. Rice asks you to vote for him because he has presented the county a present-ownership book and also field notes for the entire county. Mr. Rice has not presented the county with anything. The county paid more than \$3000 for the present-ownership maps, of which Mr. Rice obtained a portion. They were made by persons working by the day at a cost of twice the lowest bid presented to the county court, which makes it plain why Mr. Rice desires a third term. Mr. Rice also received pay for all field notes furnished and he has furnished only about half of them.
