WAREHOUSE IS NOW ASSURED

— FARMERS' UNION GOING AHEAD WITH MUCH NEEDED BUILDING —

— Building Will be Two Stories, Built of Native Stone, and Capable of Storing 150,000 Bushels of Potatoes —

A potato ware house for Redmond is now an assured fact and work on the building has already begun. The building will be located on east E street just across the railroad track, two stories high, built of native stone and with a capacity of storing 150,000 bushels of potatoes. The size of the building is to be 100x150 feet, which is large enough to accommodate four cars at one time. The upper part of the building will be used for general storage purposes, and the total cost of the structure is estimated at \$8,000. This much needed building is being built under the direction of the local chapter of the Farmers' Union. D. C. Marston, who built the Culver potato warehouse, has charge of the construction work. It is the intention now to have the warehouse far enough completed in two weeks so as to receive potatoes for storage. Farmers will soon have a chance to properly house and store their potatoes in a place where they can be seen by prospective buyers, and speedily shipped to market. NEW INDUSTRY FOR THIS CITY

A CONCRETE BUILDING BLOCK PLANT TO START NEAR CITY LIMITS

Hegardt, Elliott & Co. Have Bought Patent Right to Manufacture This Improved Building Material

The Hegardt-Elliott Co. have purchased the patent right to manufacture the "Meara" system of reinforced concrete building blocks, and are now erecting a plant about a mile and a half south of the city on the old Washington place, where they will manufacture the blocks. The men are moving from Terrebonne and will make Redmond their headquarters.

What this will mean to the future of Redmond and to the development of the entire county is hard to estimate in dollars and cents. These blocks place within reach of all a building material that is economical in first cost, and enduring as the ages. They are the only block made by the wet process, and are the only concrete building block endorsed by the United States government. 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CROOKED RIVER IS ADJUDICATED

SUPT. COCHRAN HAS FINISHED HIS WORK ON THIS STREAM

Decision of the Board of Control in the Matter Is Expected to be Given About the 1st of February

Prineville Journal: Water Supt. Cochran came in last Saturday evening and on Monday morning, the 11th inst. finished up the last of the hearings of contests in the Crooked River adjudications. An order was made giving the attorneys in each of the contests until the 15th of December to file written briefs if they so desire, and until the first of January to file any reply briefs.

Mr. Cochran says the work of tabulating the uncontested claims is nearing completion so that a decision of the Board of Control can be expected by the first of February. This then would enable the water-master of the county to take charge of the administration of the water distribution during the next irrigation season.
