ORDINANCE No. 31

rents, and look after the matters with which this ordinance is concerned, the recorder shall perform such duties.

SECTION 34.

Violation of Ordinances; Penalty.
Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or do anything herein forbidden, or refuse or fail to do what is herein directed to be done, shall, upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum of not less than five dollars and not more than fifty dollars, or imprisoned in the city jail for a term not more than ten days, except as a specific penalty is otherwise provided in this ordinance.

Passed at a regular meeting of the common council of the City of Redmond, Oregon, held on the 12th day of November, 1912.
