"The friends of Mrs. Leola Lor-g, who was defeated by R. W. Birgfield for city recorder by only one vote, are behind the contest. Sixteen women came to the polls in a heavy snow storm. Mrs. Anna Ma-gee received 10 votes for mayor, although not a candidate, and has the distinction of being the first woman to act as a judge of election in Shaniko. She also was the first woman to cost a ballot here. Mrs. C. P. Wilson was a clerk on the election board, and cast the second woman's vote. Mrs. Loring, the contesting candidate for cfty recorder, is the local manager of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co."
