MEDFORD FRUIT FILLS 775 CARS

PREVIOUS HIGH YEAR SAW 534 GO OUT—APPLES LEAD BY NEARLY 200 CARS

Fruit shipments from Medford for 1912 will reach 775 cars, against 534 for 1910, the previous banner year. There were 244 cars of pears, 436 of apples, and 16 mixed. It is estimated that 85 cars of apples are awaiting shipment. Each year in the future the ratio will increase to a greater degree as the orchards come into bearing.

FREE BOOKS FOR FARMERS
Any Farmer Can Get Valuable Books Upon Application

Many farmers are not aware that the government publishes several valuable books for free distribution. The books are apportioned to senators and congressmen, from whom they can be obtained by merely asking for them. Among the most useful of these books are the Agricultural Year Book, that for 1911 being the latest issued. The government also publishes a very practical book on "Diseases of the Horse" and another on "Diseases of Cattle," and a Report of the Bureau of Animal Industry of special value to stock raisers.

Asking for copies of these books does not place the citizen under any obligation whatever to the senators or congressmen, as the books are printed by the government and paid for by the taxpayers. Many an Oregon farmer has cured sick horses and cattle by following the directions in the government's doctor books. PAISLEY GOT THERE FIRST
That Town Secures Space for the 1915 Land Show

The exhibitors at the recent first Northwest Land Products show at Portland, at a banquet tendered to them by the Portland Commercial Club, voted unanimously to make the show an annual event. The gathering represented exhibits from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia. In less than 24 hours after the band master sounded "taps," closing the show on the last night, Manager Bond received the first application for space at the next show, to be held in October, 1915. It was made by President Bailey of the Paisley Irrigation Project, on behalf of the Paisley Commercial Club, which made one of the most attractive community exhibits at the recent land show. "I will give you the best space next year," said Manager Bond. "Your enterprise in bringing your exhibits 150 miles in wagons and 266 miles by railroad, this year, will not be forgotten."

SHOWED GOOD RATION TO MAKE HENS LAY

An excellent ration to make hens lay, worked out by the poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural College, was exhibited there during Farmers' Week. It contains 30 lbs. of wheat, 10 lbs. bran, 10 lbs. oats, 5 lbs. each of middlings, linseed meal, whole corn, ground corn, and beef scrap, 2 lbs. charcoal, 3 lbs. each grit and shell, 1 oss. salt, and 20 lbs. kale.

This is sufficient for one hen for a year, and if she is a good hen she should produce 200 eggs in the year on this ration. If linseed meal is high or whole corn for any reason difficult to obtain, either or both, may be omitted and good results still be obtained.
