ONE OF WEST'S PET BILLS IS SURE TO BE DEFEATED

One of Governor West's pet measures, that prohibiting the shipment of liquors from wet territory into counties or cities now dry, came up in the Legislature Monday, with a divided report from the committee. Many of the members believe that the bill should not pass, as it would be a useless piece of legislation, for interstate shipments, not under control of the Legislature, would replace shipments made from points within the state.

2 NEW BILLS AIM AT CIGARETTES, GAMBLING

The cigarette maker and dealer are hit by a bill introduced in the House by Representative Gill. It fixes a fine of \$25 to \$250 for any newspaper, magazine or periodical that advertises the brand or sale of any cigarettes. This penalty also applies to advertising cigarettes by circulars in public places.

Another bill, introduced by Bonebrake, prohibits games of chance of whatever nature in saloon, and prohibits the giving of drink checks. This bill carries a penalty of a fine of \$250 or imprisonment.
