Floods and Fire Devastate Ohio and Indiana Cities and Towns--- Life and Property Loss Appalling

The floods and fires that swept through cities and towns in Ohio and Indiana last week destroyed thousands of lives and ran the property loss up into the millions. Dayton, Ohio, where three rivers and a creek come together, suffered the greatest loss both in life and property. The city is protected by a levee, but recent rains raised the rivers and the levee broke, flooding the city from six to 15 feet deep. The loss of life and amount of property will not be definitely known for some time. Rescue work is going on as fast as possible, and contributions of food and money are pouring into the city from all parts of the United States.

Other cities and towns in Ohio suffered also from flood and fire to a greater or less extent. Portions of Indiana were also ravaged by flood, and fire did great damage. Peru, Ind., was hard hit, and many lives lost there.

AT DAYTON

Dayton, O., March 27.—Last night's devastating fire which apparently slumbered during the day has begun again to burn fiercely. Watchers from the top of the cash register offices saw numerous explosions in the flames.

Many dead are being removed from Riverdale, one of the suburbs. They are being stacked three deep along the bank.

The estimate of dead (5000), apparently is near correct. The total number of dead will never be known and Dayton dreads the day when receding waters will lay bare the full extent of the disaster.

All of today's bodies were washed up or exposed as the water fell. No one knows how many have been recovered. The 5 different parts of the city are practically cut off from each other.

Lack of Boats

The toll of life was augmented through the lack of boats. Riverdale, where the greater number were saved, had 25 boats taken from a

pleasure resort. There volunteers risked their lives to remove persons trapped in their homes.

"Women and children first," was the order, and many husbands and fathers were forced to stay in their homes while their families were removed to safety.

"Swim," the rescuers told the men who were able to do so. On the roof of one house all day yesterday a little boy clung. He was removed near dead than alive today.

Supplies Needed

George F. Burba, representing Governor Cox, telegraphed today to the governor, urging that special emphasis be given the great need of immediate supplies of provisions. There is not a full day's food supply in the city and before night it is likely that 1000 persons who have been held downtown without food or water since Tuesday, will be released and there will be no provisions for them nor places to care for them. Burba says that within a day bodies of thousands of horses will be decomposing in the muddy streets and it will be impossible even to care for the bodies.

"If the death list is only 1000, I will consider it a marvelous dispensation," telegraphed Governor Cox's secretary today. "If it is 10,000 I will not be surprised."

"Horrible as this is, the real suffering will grow worse for days. The refugees are being fed from hand to mouth with less than a day's food supply ahead."

Thousands Trapped

After a day of gruelling work, volunteers have removed more than half a hundred bodies from the waters of the Great Miami River and Wolf Creek, saved upward of 500 who for two days have been clinging to roofs or living in upper stories.

With the coming of nightfall the efforts to rescue more persons was slackened and all of Dayton not in the central flood district waited in dread for the nightly fires which

have added horrors to the already terrible situation.

Knowledge that thousands are trapped on upper floors of the buildings, where they cannot be reached, adds to their terror tonight. The waters in all the inundated districts fell from three to five feet today and the currents of the river and creek have slackened so that it is possible, except in the center of the city, for small boats to reach sufferers.

Rescue With Flatcar

On Third street, in West Dayton a flatcar weighted down with pig iron was run down into the flooded district on streetcar tracks to bring out water-bound persons. Six men got on the car, and a hundred or more pulled it out of the water by a huge cable.

Rescued persons who for two days expected death with every minute, were lifted from the car to waiting automobiles and taken to shelter. First they were given several cups of hot coffee and wrapped in warm garments. Women and children collapsed, and men were so weak with cold and fatigue they had to be carried. Hundreds were rescued this way.

AT COLUMBUS

Columbus, O., March 27.—Between 600 and 1000 persons lost their lives in the flooded West Side of Columbus.

The true extent of the tragedies enacted during the sweeping away of homes and the exact toll will not be known for several days, until the mass of hundreds of uprooted trees, which are strewn over the low lands south of the city, are uncovered.

Col. D. N. Oyster, an attache of the City Sanitary Department, reported that two truck loads of bodies were removed from one point on the West Side.

Hundreds of people are still marooned in flooded homes, their rescue being impossible because of the swift currents. Many boats already
