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GOOD ROADS MEETING IS HELD HERE

OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS OF THE CROOK COUNTY GOOD ROADS ASSN. OUTLINE PLAN FOR BETTERMENT OF ALL ROADS IN THE COUNTY

Officers and directors of the Crook County Good Roads Association met in Redmond Sunday and held a meeting in the parlor of the Hotel Redmond in the afternoon. All the officers and directors of the association were present, and several other members of the association also attended the meeting.

The matter of good roads in all parts of the county was taken up and discussed at length, and it was the sense of the meeting that the officers and directors make a trip over the county and ascertain just what is needed in the way of good roads, and estimate as near as possible the probable cost of improving existing roads and opening up new roads necessary.

It was decided that the trip be made the first of June, and all members of the association, or any others interested in the movement, are extended an invitation to go on the trip. The trip is expected to occupy at least three days.

President Lynch of the association, says that much enthusiasm over the good roads movement is being displayed all over the county, and encouragement to the officers and directors is coming in from all sides.

That the officers and directors of the association mean business in this movement of betterment of roads for the entire county can better be understood when it is realized that they are doing all the work free. There is no salary attached to any office. All of the men at the head of the movement are busy business men, and their time will be taken and they will be under expense on the three days' trip they intend to make over the entire county.

From the united and determined effort shown by the business men all over Crook county it now looks as if the good roads proposition is to be put on a sound basis of something done.
