H. M. Smith, who left Redmond some time ago, has returned and will reside here.

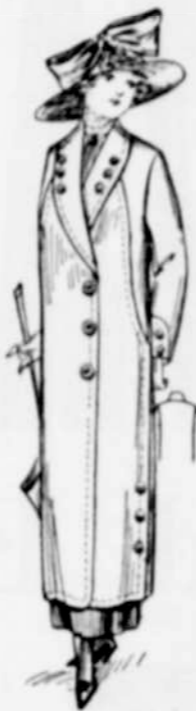
