FIRST TO BENEFIT**BY THE NEW PROJECT**

Peter Jensen, who has a ranch about three miles north of Laidlaw, is the first to benefit by the new Tumalo Project. Mr. Jensen came to his land about three years ago and cleared his place up. He came, however, after the adjudication of water to the land on the project, and he did not secure any water, because he had used none before the adjudication. For the last two years he has been dry farming and has made a success of that, but now he has secured water.

When the state bought the reservoir site the water rights of the old Wimer ditch went with it. Some of this water has been turned over to Mr. Jensen. Superintendent Wallace and Mr. Cady were out to his place Monday and put in a headgate. He is now using the water on a piece of alfalfa he started this summer. On account of the rains, the alfalfa already had a fine start, but it will now do better.
