NOTICE OF CONTEST

Department of the Interior, United States Land Office, The Dalles, Oregon, September 10, 1913. To Edgar L. Stanley of Redmond, Oregon, Contestee.

You are hereby notified that Inez Buckner, who gives 609 Martin ave., Portland, Ore., as his postoffice address, did on July 21, 1913, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead, entry No. 1111, Serial No. 010398, made June 6, 1912, for the South Half of Southwest Quarter, Section 10, and North Half, Northwest Quarter, Section 15, Township 15, South, Range 11, East Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said Edgar L. Stanley has remained away from said homestead for about one year after filing; that he has not made any residence on said land; has not made any improvements on said land and has done nothing whatever toward making a residence.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be canceled thereunder without your further right to be heard thereon, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed, stating when and the postoffice to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
