COL. THATCHER HERE MONDAY

Noted Good Roads Speaker
Will Give a Talk to Red-
mond People

WILL URGE VOTING
FOR \$200,000 BONDS

This Is Mr. Thatcher's Third
Visit to This City and Large
Audiences Expected to Greet
Good Roads Booster

M. A. Lynch, president of the Crook County Good Roads Association, has made arrangements for Col. Charles W. Thatcher, the noted good roads apostle, to speak in Redmond Monday, October 6. It is the intention to have Mr. Thatcher give a talk to the school children in the afternoon at the school house, and another address in the evening at Elbert's hall to the grown-ups. The subject of the talks both afternoon and evening will be along the lines of good roads.

In the evening talk Mr. Thatcher will strongly impress upon his hearers the advisability of voting for bonding the county for \$200,000 at the election on November 4, the money to be used for good roads purposes in the county. He will point out the benefit to be derived by all the people in the county from good roads and show that the later coming people will have to pay their share of the repayment of the above amount of bonding money, as the bonds run for 20 years.

Col. Thatcher speaks at the Laidlaw fair today, and Saturday holds a good roads meeting at Prineville. This will be the third visit Mr. Thatcher has paid to Redmond, and those who have heard him on former visits will surely be glad to listen to him again, as he is a forceful and entertaining speaker, and presents the good roads problem in a clear and concise manner so that it can be easily understood.

All over the state different counties are getting in line for bonding for good roads, the latest being Coos county, where a bonding issue of \$400,000 is proposed.

Good roads is the only solution tending toward the welfare and prosperity of Oregon, and this part

of the state in particular, and Col. Thatcher will clearly illustrate to his audience Monday that they should use every effort to have the bond issue carry in this county at the November election.

ADVERTISING APPROPRIATION

A perplexing question for every merchant who has come to the point where he sees advertising is essential to his success is what amount should be appropriated for the purpose of advertising. This is a question that confronts every man in business sooner or later. He may drift along with the tide and "grub out an existence," but he never can hope to build up a permanent and profitable business without a definite advertising campaign backed up by a definite advertising appropriation.

The appropriation should be large enough to provide for failure at the start. The beginner generally finds advertising discouraging, but it is not a game for the quitter.

It is well for the advertiser to move with caution. He is entering a large field. However, "to make money you must spend money." Result getting is the definite purpose of every advertising appropriation. In making an appropriation the results desired and expected should be taken into consideration, and an appropriation made that is reasonable under all the circumstances. But when the appropriation is once made—stick. The advertising plan may be changed, but caution should be used in cutting the appropriation during progress of the advertising campaign.

When a merchant is just embarking in business his advertising appropriation should of necessity be larger than the established merchant. The retail merchant just starting in business frequently spends about 10 per cent in advertising. The merchant prince of New York City spent 50 per cent in advertising when he started in business.

The per cent usually spent by retail houses in advertising ranges from two to ten per cent, depending on conditions. Some retail houses spend more than ten per cent in advertising.

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LAMONTA TO HAVE BIG RABBIT DRIVE

DATE FOR EVENT IS SET FOR SUNDAY, OCTOBER 12

Farmers in Above Section Will Take Means to Exterminate the Pests

Over in the Lamonta district rabbits have been such a pest the past season that the farmers are going to take means to exterminate as many of them as they possibly can. To do this they have arranged for a big rabbit drive for Sunday, October 12, and all the people in Crook county are invited to be present and take part in the program.

W. M. Floyd, who has charge of the drive, was in Redmond recently and stated the drive would start about 10:30 a. m., and all who are going to participate in the event are requested to meet at Joe Wagner's place at 10 o'clock. Only a limited number of shotguns will be allowed to be used, the object being to drive the rabbits into a corral and kill them there, this being deemed the best way to kill a large number of them.

Farmers in the Lamonta district state that if the rabbits are not exterminated, or considerably lessened in numbers this year, there will be no use of putting in a crop next year, as the pests will surely ruin it before it has time to ripen and can be harvested.

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GOLD FOUND IN CITY LIMITS OF PORTLAND

DISCOVERY MADE IN MOUNT TABOR PARK

Assay Shows Value of \$1,092.63 to the Ton—Find Made Several Weeks Ago

Gold—real gold, too—that assays \$1,092.63 to the ton, is the yellowish substance discovered at Mount Tabor Park, in Portland, several weeks ago by Foreman T. Tanna, in charge of construction work now under way in the park, says the Portland Journal. As a result of the assay it is probable that guards will be placed around the spot where the gold was discovered until the full extent of the pocket or lode or what it may be is determined.

The gold was discovered when workmen in the roadway through the park struck some sand and gravel. In digging through this an amount of yellowish substance was uncovered and when seen by the workmen, all made a dive for it. Foreman Tanna immediately gathered up a quantity of the substance and took it to the City Hall for inspection by Park Superintendent Mische.

Superintendent Mische was rather dubious that the metal was gold, as claimed by Tanna, who had spent several years gold prospecting.

Finally it was agreed that the metal would be assayed and if it was found to be gold Mr. Mische would pay the cost of assaying, while if not gold Tanna was to pay the

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
