REDMOND EXHIBIT WAS PARTICULARLY NOTEWORTHY Assistant General Freight and Passenger Agent W. C. Wilkes of the Oregon Trunk, and J. T. Hardy, traveling freight agent of the road, passed through this city last Saturday on their way to Portland from the Crook County Fair.

"Grains, grasses, vegetables, livestock and dairy products all showed large displays, the exhibit from Redmond being particularly noteworthy," said the officials.

Specimens of all the exhibits will be taken by the Oregon Trunk for use in display cars, and some are to be sent to eastern land shows. George Dickson won the O. T.'s prize of a heavy farm wagon for the best beef cattle. Mr. Dickson expects to exhibit the same cattle at the Portland live stock show and at Lewiston.

NO FAIR AT MADRAS Several Reasons Given for Cancelling the Event At a meeting of the directors of the Madras Fair Society, a few days since, it was unwillingly decided that there would be no fair this fall for various reasons, says the Madras Pioneer.

The principal reason being that the title to the grounds was not yet completed and to get ready for a fair and to have a good show would be impossible in the short time that was left before the dates set earlier in the season.

Another reason was found to be that a track on which a horse race could be pulled off could not very well be built at this time owing to the dry condition of the soil. Horse racing being one of the leading features that was going to be pushed as an attraction to the fair at its opening.
