stored in Sisters at all times.

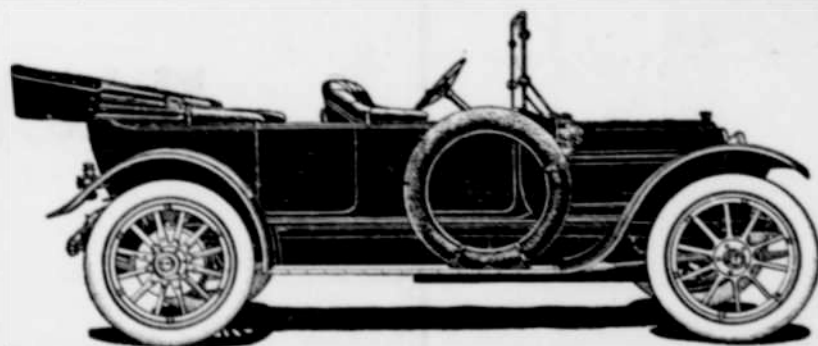
