HELPFUL AIDS FOR FARMERS

Business Enterprises in Redmond That Pay Money to the Farmers

IS OF MUCH BENEFIT TO THIS SECTION

Redmond Union Warehouse Co. and Deschutes Valley Creamery Bring in Outside Money for Products Raised Here

There are two institutions in Redmond that are a big help to the farmers and stock raisers of Crook county—the Redmond Union Warehouse and the Deschutes Valley Creamery Company.

Both of the above have been the means of bringing in outside money and putting it in circulation here in payment of products raised and grown in this section. The Redmond Union Warehouse Company has, for a considerable time, been shipping out to Portland markets cattle, hogs and farm produce, and during the past summer bought from the farmers around here and shipped to different points large quantities of garden stuff, such as cabbage, onions, carrots, turnips, celery, etc. The warehouse company worked up a large trade with the Oregon Trunk railroad in the above kind of shipments during the past season, and the summer of 1914 will see the orders greatly increased for garden products from this section.

Each week the warehouse ships carloads of hogs and cattle to the Portland market, for which top market prices are received, and all this money goes into circulation here. These live stock shipments, in which several farmers can join if they so desire, have been the means of obtaining an outlet for the stock raised here, and has also stimulated the raising of more and better stock. This warehouse means more to the farmers than some of them have an idea of, for it makes it possible for the farmer at all times to find a market for his stock and produce, and takes off his hands much of the detail of shipping which he would have

to attend to himself if he shipped his products individually to outside points. The Redmond Union Warehouse is strictly a farmers' warehouse and works to the end to better the farmer in all manner of means.

The Deschutes Valley Creamery Company—successor to the Redmond Creamery Company—is another institution that has helped the farmer wonderfully in the past few months. It has been the means of bringing in a large amount of outside money that was distributed among the farmers in a large territory, and made it possible for them to increase their dairy herds.

The reputation of the butter made by the creamery is widespread and new customers are being gained each week throughout the state. With two such plants as the above there is every reason to look forward to a prosperous future for Redmond and the territory surrounding the city, for they are institutions that dispose of the products grown and raised here and bring in the cash for distribution among the farmers.

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BOND ISSUE IS TURNED DOWN

Crook County Voters Show the \$200,000 Bonding Measure Completely Under

ALL OTHER MEASURES WIN BY BIG MAJORITIES

Salem and Oregon City Go "Dry"—Sterilization Bill Is Defeated

The road bond issue of \$200,000 for good roads in Crook county was defeated at Tuesday's election. All referendum measures on the ballot were carried in the county. The largest majority against bonding the county was at Prineville, the vote being 154 against and 69 for. Sisters also voted against the bonds, 88 to 4. Redmond, Bend, Deschutes, Laidlaw and Metolius gave majorities in favor of the bond issue.

In the state all the referendum laws, with the exception of the sterilization act, won out by good, safe majorities. Local option carried in Salem, Oregon City and several other towns.

In the national election Democrats win in the East; Tammany was defeated in New York City and for county officers.

CALF WAS RAISED HERE BY G. A. BRADLEY

Winning Animal Will Also Be Shown at the National Stock Show, Chicago

When it comes right down to raising prize winning cattle, G. A. Bradley, who has a farm adjoining the city on the north, does not take a back seat for anyone. Several weeks ago he sold and shipped a Guernsey calf to W. W. Marsh of Waterloo, Iowa. Last month this calf was entered among the dairy cattle at the Iowa Dairy Congress at Waterloo and took first prize. Next week the calf will be exhibited at the National Stock Show at Chicago, and it is expected it will give a good account of itself.

NICE SUM OF MONEY IS BEING BROUGHT IN

HOG AND CATTLE OWNERS ARE BENEFITED

Redmond Union Warehouse Company Brings in \$5,276.52 During the Month of October

Since the establishment here of the Redmond Union Warehouse Company the farmers and stock raisers of Crook county have found a market for their products, and much money is being brought into this section each month from Portland from the sale of stock. A year ago the farmers were up against the proposition of having no market for their agricultural products or stock. It did not pay them to ship to Portland or other markets individually, but with the advent of the warehouse, and combining shipments, the way has been opened for them to realize a nice sum of money each month.

During the month of October shipments made by the warehouse people totaled the sum of \$5,276.52, and this money all went into circulation in this immediate vicinity. The shipments were as follows:

October 1—106 hogs and 1 cow; \$985.00.

October 7—67 hogs, 1 cow and 2 calves; \$1,227.96.

October 22—71 hogs; \$1,399.95.

October 28—109 hogs; \$1,663.61.

The above is an object lesson and shows what a benefit to the farmers this warehouse is. By its methods of shipping, ready money is brought into this section that otherwise would not find its way here.
