

Is Defeated

The road bond issue of \$200,000 for good roads in Crook county was defeated at Tuesday's election. All referendum measures on the ballot were carried in the county. The largest majority against bonding the county was at Prineville, the vote being 154 against and 69 for. Sisters also voted against the bonds, 88 to 4. Redmond, Bend, Deschutes, Laidlaw and Metolius gave majorities in favor of the bond issue In the state all the referendum

laws, with the exception of the sterilization act, won out by good, safe majorities. Local option carried in Salem, Oregon City and several other towns.


